

San Diego, Angels In Tie For Lead

Oaks, Beaten by Seals, Tumble to Third Spot; Beavers Now Occupy League's Cellar.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6.—(AP)—San Diego and Los Angeles shared the top spot in the Pacific coast league today with four victories and one loss each, and the San Francisco Seals at last demonstrated they could play a game without falling to pieces toward the end of the nine-inning route.

San Diego took a close one from Hollywood yesterday, 1-0, thanks to Padre Pitcher Hobert. The southpaw not only pitched a five-hit game, but singled in the eighth and brought in First Baseman Stinson with the winning score.

Los Angeles fooled the customers, and instead of delivering the customary three or four home runs per game, as in the previous hits with Portland, delivered only one round tripper in squeaking past the beavers, 6-5.

Seals Brace Up.
The San Francisco Seals, after losing three previous games to the Oakland A's, by blowing up at critical moments, reversed the procedure and trounced the A's, 7-5, with a four-run spurge in the ninth.

Sacramento started out with four runs in the first inning, but had a hard time defeating Seattle, 6-5. It was the third time the kolons had dumped the Rainiers in the four games of their current series.

Seattle tied the score in the fifth and Van Sate, Sacramento's recent acquisition from Columbus, Ga., took over the pitching job from Schmidt, holding the visitors to one more run in the sixth. The kolons garnered two more runs and victory in the fifth frame.

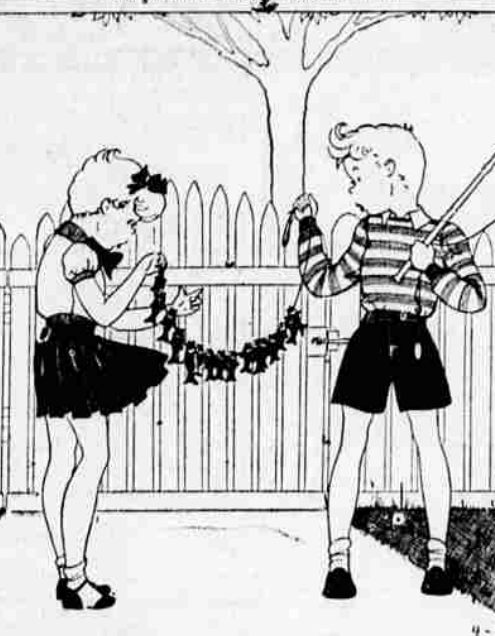

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(AP)—The civilian conservation corps received President Roosevelt's

congratulations yesterday on the seventh anniversary of its establishment.

Noting that more than 2,400,000 young men have been enrolled in 4,000 camps since 1933, the president wrote Director James J. McEntee:

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Oregon's Amateur Fliers Facing Ban

Restricted Lanes Force Them to Fly Over Hazardous Country or Not at All.

SALEM, Ore., April 6.—(UP)—Oregon's amateur fliers are facing the prospect of having their wings clipped by a civil aeronautics authority ban on all but federally-licensed planes flying in interstate lanes.

The situation has come to the attention of the state board of aeronautics because the federal authority has started to enforce the ruling. The state-licensed pilots find themselves hemmed in by the two major interstate lanes and forced to fly over dangerous country if they wish to fly at all.

A federal air lane is a ten-mile swath on either side of the route, usually a straight line and usually over uninhabited sections.

The coast lane uses the whole Willamette valley between Portland and Eugene, and nearly all of the safer area from Eugene to Medford. The Columbia gorge lane creates much the same situation in the north.

Pilots on either side of the lane are limited to the region on the side on which they are based because the authority denies them the right to cross. A club on the west side of the transcoast lane would be limited to flying over the dangerous coast range.

The state board is willing to champion the cause of the home fliers if it thinks it has basis for a good fight, but the broad control the government exercises over interstate commerce makes that basis extremely shaky.

Ruling Sought

In an effort to determine if the federal authority is exceeding its rights the state board will ask Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle for an opinion.

The state board has an acute interest in the case. One of the main purposes of the board is to foster aviation and there is probably no better way to do this than encourage home air-mindedness.

The amateur pilots are of the same stock that produced the Wright brothers and other pioneers of aviation and it is entirely possible that a serious setback in Oregon flying might result from strict enforcement of the ruling.

Meanwhile the amateurs are not taking the ruling quietly. They have begun to organize and their protest is becoming louder every day.

Income Tax Payments in Oregon Show Gain

SALEM, April 6.—(Special)—State income tax collections for 1940, up to April 1 aggregated \$3,467,460, as against \$2,680,179 for the same period in 1939 and \$2,887,567 in 1938, the state tax commission reported Friday.

The 1940 returns, for which the filing period expired April 1, are based on 1939 incomes.

Second installment payments, due October 1, were fixed by the commission at \$1,391,325. Unpaid installments at the same time last year were \$1,071,033.
