Garner Not Bidden To F. R.'s Confab

WASHINGTON, April 10.—(AP)—Disregarding customary procedure, President Roosevelt failed to invite Vice-President Garner to a white house legislative conference.

The unexplained action developed immediate speculation that relations between the president and Garner had cooled. Although offering on some major issues, the two men have been personally friendly throughout the seven years of Mr. Roosevelt's administration.

Only the two democratic leaders—Senator Barkley of Kentucky and Representative Rayburn of Texas—attended today's conference.

Garner and Speaker Bankhead regularly have attended such conferences in the past. Bankhead now is in Florida for a rest, and Garner was not invited.

It was reported authoritatively that the vice-president had received no word from the white house as to why his counsel was not sought.

National Guard To Have New Units

SALEM, April 10.—(AP)—Addition of an anti-aircraft battalion and a searchlight battery to Oregon's 24th coast artillery by the war department was announced today by Major General George A. White, Oregon national guard and 41st division commander.

Anti-aircraft batteries will be formed at Albany and Cottage Grove to fire 3-inch anti-aircraft guns and at Marshfield to fire 50 caliber machine guns. Batteries will be formed by conversion of fixed batteries until new guns arrive from the factories.

The searchlight battery will be located at Albany, battalion headquarters.

Batteries to man harbor defense guns at the mouth of the Columbia will be provided by batteries A and C, the latter a new battery, at Klamath Falls and battery D at Ashland. A battalion headquarters battery is to be organized at Ashland.

The new regimental organization provides for 15 new officers, bringing the total to 41. Enlisted strength will be 599.

Flood Control Program Must List New Projects

WASHINGTON, April 10.—(AP)—Previous tentative allocations under the \$70,000,000 general flood control bill must be reduced to comply with a house mandate that 10 per cent of the appropriation be spent on new undertakings, army engineers said today.

The reductions include elimination of the \$311,000 item for proposed relocation of the highway at the Detroit reservoir in Oregon.
