At Sacramento last night a homer by Muller, Portland infielder, with two on base, turned the trick that let Portland hand Sacramento its fifth straight defeat.

Sacramento's Solons did have one consoling thought however, in

the seventh inning Art Garibaldi, third baseman, scored from second on a single to break the Solons' 22 inning scoreless streak.

Hollywood's victory over Los Angeles last night started when the Stars scored two runs in the first inning. They never were headed as they breezed along to pick up three more in the fifth. Los Angeles rolled in the ninth to have three runs, but it was too late to catch Hollywood's Stars.

### Capital Gains Tax Idea Gains Favor

WASHINGTON, April 10.—(AP)—Senator George (D., Ga.) said today that business leaders "not unfriendly" to the administration had proposed a three-fold revision in tax laws to stimulate private employment.

The program, as described by George, contemplated these changes:

1. Substitution of a flat 10 or 12 per cent capital gains tax for the present higher graduated levy on securities issued for new enterprises. The suggested tax would be applied for the first three years after issue, permitting quicker turnover and making the securities more attractive to investors.
2. Inauguration of a similar tax on refinancing issues for railroads and utilities, with the same time limitation.
3. A 50 per cent reduction in the taxes paid on profits derived from commodities exported in excess of the average amount sold abroad in the previous three years.

George said he had no doubt that this program would be laid before treasury officials. He voiced doubt, however, that it would get before the present congress.

### Tom Seaton, Pitcher for Beavers in 1910, Passes

EL PASO, Texas, April 11.—(AP)—Tom Seaton, who pitched six shutouts and won 27 games for the Philadelphia Phillies in 1914, died in a hospital here last night after a long illness. He was 52.

Seaton was a member of the Portland Beaver club of 1910, hailed by many as being the best minor league club of all time. He won 28 games for the Beavers.
