New Gasoline Has Superior Power

CINCINNATI, O., April 11.—(AP)—A new American gasoline named Triptan, which gives on bench tests 50 per cent more power than the best military fuels anywhere in the world, was described to the American Chemical society today.

Less spectacular, but equally important for leadership in aviation, was a new laboratory eye, described by a group of college professors as able to look at hydrocarbons, the stuff that makes gasoline, and give data for calculating an endless list of new types of gasoline.

"The developments," said Dr. Gustav Eloff of Chicago, "make it certain that United States refining facilities can produce any conceivable quantity of fuels for United States aviation, and if needed, for all the world."

Triptan has been tried only in laboratories. Its 50 per cent extra power is obtained without adding lead, which will increase the power possibly by another 20 per cent.

beginning operation in this area; disbanding the old fashioned method of manufacturing gas from coal and oil and installing the up-to-date modern present-day system of distributing butane gas, a refined product of petroleum.

M. E. Sands, vice-president and general manager of the California-Pacific Utilities company, in commenting on the progress made by the gas company during the past five years, stated: "Butane gas, such as we receive here in southern Oregon, is microscopically clean, quite similar in structure and function to natural gas. Its acceptance throughout the country is fast approaching demand. In fact," continued Mr. Sands, "our own experience here in southern Oregon shows that since installing the new gas, consumption has increased over 253 per cent.
