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WHEN they use the phrase "To-
tal War" in spoken or written
comment about the European con-
flict, a war involving all persons
in the belligerent countries includ-
ing civilians as well as soldiers is
meant. However the phrase may
as well have another meaning very
soon—it may mean total in the
sense that all territory on the con-
tinent of Europe will be in-
volved.

It is only reasonable to expect,
however, that when all nations
large and small are finally involv-
ed, the war will then begin its se-
cond phase—the era of utter horror,
death and destruction from bombs
rained upon cities—all cities. Then
we shall see a total war.

There has been something of a
total war waged against the fish
life in the Umpqua river these last
several days. The netters at the

company inadvertently has been
attacking them from the upper end
by dumping the river full of red

something.

she lost the first world war be-
cause she had to fight on TWO
fronts. One of her first objectives
in this war has been to confine
the fighting to one front. That
is why Hitler made his deal with
Stalin.

Now, with dramatic suddenness,
she takes on ANOTHER FRONT
in Scandinavia and risks taking on
a THIRD front in the Balkans.

It looks as if Germany is either
utterly confident of her ability to
win the war or the allied blockade
has been hurting worse than has
been admitted and threatened to
hurt still worse.

Elliott Fans 13 Batters in Victory Over Salem

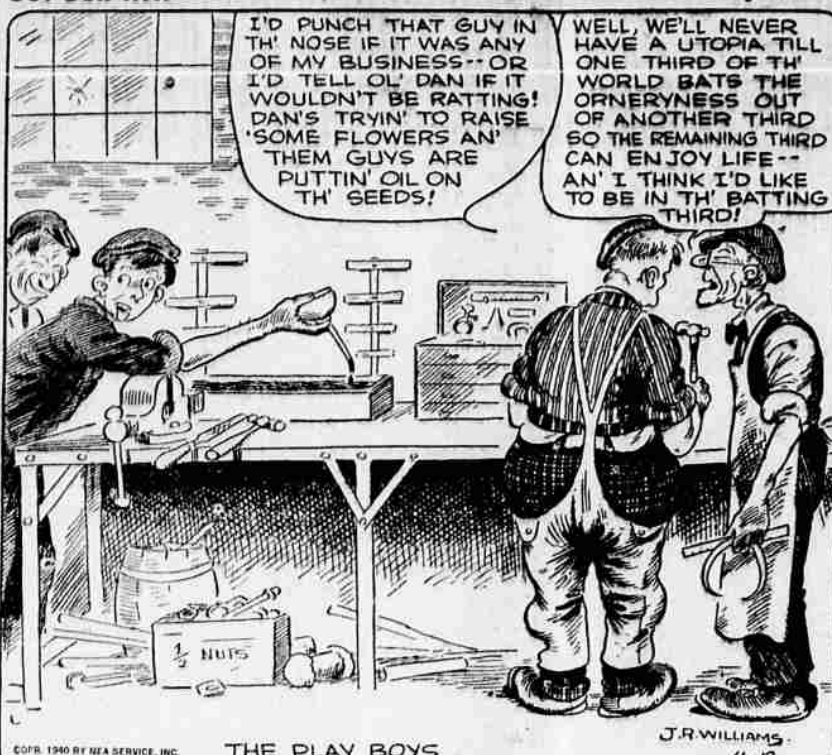
CORVALLIS, April 12.—(AP)—
