Tuesday night, April 16, the Umpqua post and auxiliary will have as their guest, Henry Baker, Red Cross Pacific branch manager, who will speak to the group on Red Cross in the world today, according to Mrs. M. R. Richards, president. The auxiliary will also make plans at this meeting for the coming visit of its department president, Mrs. William Horsfall on April 29.

Last Monday night the post and auxiliary were hosts to James P. Mulcare, national field secretary of the American Legion from Fort Milley, San Francisco. Mr. Mulcare spoke to the group at the Umpqua hotel on rehabilitation and aid to widows of veterans. Department Commander Nell Allen of Grants Pass was also present. The following day Commander and Mrs. Vincent Malone entertained them at dinner. Wednesday Commander and Mrs. Malone dined with Mr. Mulcare to Portland for further conferences.

At the child welfare program of the post and auxiliary last week Mr. Crittenden spoke of the juvenile delinquency problem and Mrs. Madge Dixon, department child welfare chairman gave a resume of the work done for children. Mrs. George Caskey, local chairman said that this month the interest of the American Legion auxiliary is centered on the welfare of the American children. Vera McClintock Jones treated the group with several songs.

Speaking of the child welfare work Mrs. Dixon said the auxiliary is interested primarily of course in the welfare of the children of the dead and disabled world war veterans "but we have found that we cannot promote the welfare of veterans' children unless we serve for the welfare of all children. Our direct aid is mainly for the children of veterans, yet our efforts are accomplishing much to bring health, happiness and opportunity to a vast number of children outside of veterans' families.

"A square deal for every child" is our motto. We give our active cooperation to all sound movements having this goal. Our support is behind legislation to safeguard childhood. We work to bring the benefits of new legislation to the children.

"Legislation recently passed opens many possibilities of obtaining financial help for dependent children of veterans. We feel that it is our responsibility to find the children eligible for this help and aid them in securing it. Health records allow early detection and correction of physical defects, and are important in securing federal aid in many cases. We are at-

Safeguard against repetition of that tragic April of 23 years ago is seen by the auxiliary women in the increased defensive measures that the United States now is making. Mrs. Gordon explained. "The auxiliary has worked constantly for strong defenses as a guarantee of peace and is continuing to exert its influence in support of the steps necessary to make America secure from attack."

"In 1917 the United States was completely unprepared to meet the threat of the European war," Mrs. Gordon said. "The intelligent powers knew this and believing we could not be a factor in the war, committed the aggressions against us. We of the auxiliary are determined that this chain of events shall not be repeated. We want the United States to be strong enough so that no nation will entertain thoughts of aggression against us."

"We who remember the April of 1917 know what war means to women. We know how it feels to see a son, husband, father or brother leave home for war. Our sympathy goes out to those women of Europe who are experiencing this today, and we hope that peace can be achieved for them before war is unleashed in all of its terror. We believe that our country can be protected from this new war and from any future war threats if it is well prepared to defend itself. With a navy second to none and with an army modern in size and equipment, we are sure that the coming of spring will never again mean the beginning of war and grief for American women."

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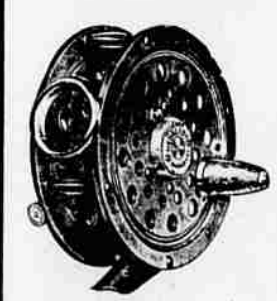
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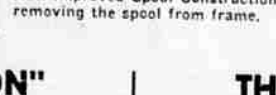


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
