Grangers Honor Pest Hunt Victors

Melrose Hall Program Also Includes Musical Numbers, Talks on Weed Control.

Winners in the Melrose grange pest hunt for the year 1939 were honored guests at a 7 o'clock potluck dinner at the Melrose grange hall last night. A special table was provided for the 29 members who turned in the highest scores during the year's pest eradication program. Other members and guests in attendance numbered about 50. The hall was decorated in spring flowers.

Three applications for membership were received at the business session of the grange following the dinner. The lecturer's program followed the business session. Community singing was led by Fred Goff, with Crystal Conn at the piano. Other entertainment features included a vocal solo by Betty Joe Nelson, accompanied by Roy Wickstrom; accordion and guitar duet by Alice and Bob Myers; vocal selections by Oscar Houser and Roy Wickstrom; vocal quartet, May Taylor, Jewel Green, Roy Wickstrom and Floyd Felt, with Margaret Reece at the piano; instrumental selections by the grange orchestra.

The subject for discussion, "Weeds as a Public Liability," was presented by Fred Goff. County Agent J. Roland Parker, in an instructive talk, declared there is need for immediate and widespread work on weed control. Many counties are finding it necessary, he said, to spend large sums annually on weed eradication. Douglas county, he reported, has avoided much of the seriousness of the situation which faces other parts of the state by timely work to prevent the spread of noxious weeds and by using care in buying weed-free seed. He urged, however, that all residents be on the lookout for new types of weeds, and report such discoveries to the county agent. He illustrated his talk with weed mounts, showing the various types of weeds prevalent in the county. Members brought weeds to the meeting for identification and for discussion as to control methods.

Announcement was made that the Young Grangers association of Melrose, the Home Economics club and the agricultural committee are joining forces in a program of beautification of the grounds around the grange hall.

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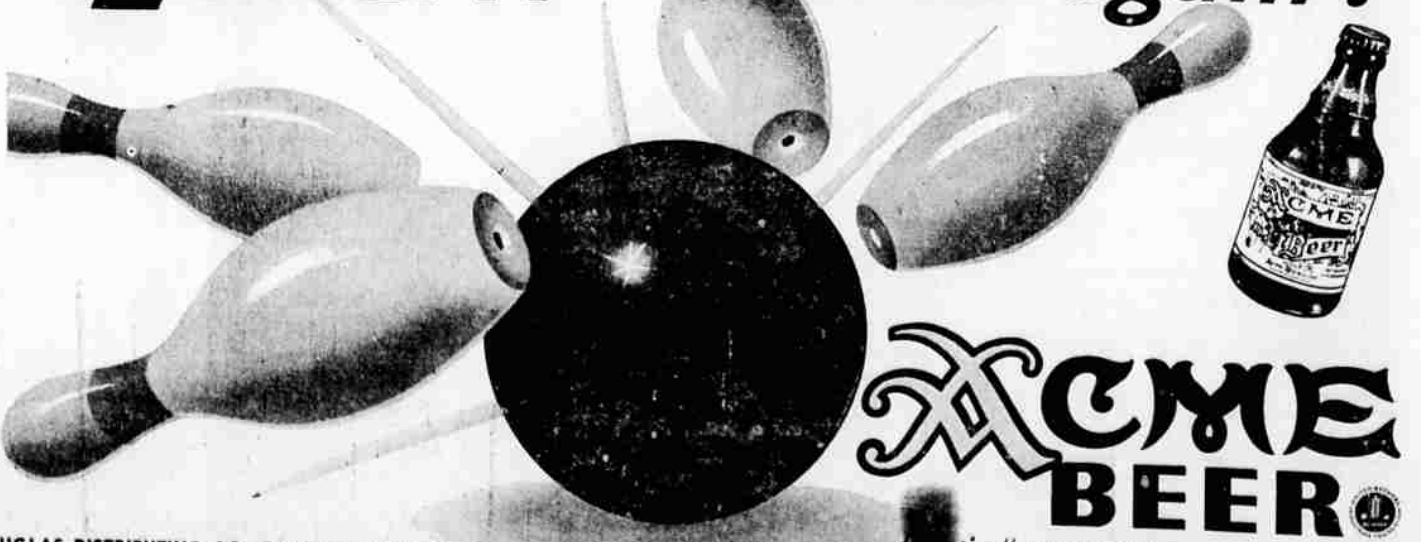
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
