## Edison Role Is Mickey Rooney Hit

The first of a double-series of biographical screen sketches of the life of Thomas A. Edison, the great American inventor, "Edison, the Boy," starring the effervescent Mickey "Andy Hardy" Rooney in what is probably his most effective dramatic role to date, opened Wednesday at Hunt's Indian theatre for a four-day stand. A sequel to this story, featuring Spencer Tracy as "Edison, the Man" is billed for the theatre in the near future. The movie version of Edison's boyhood days is based upon actual incidents that happened during his turbulent early life, during which time his insatiable thirst for knowledge along scientific lines, particularly in the fields of chemistry and electricity, unwittingly kept him, his family and the populace of Port Huron, in a constant turmoil. Rooney is brilliant as young Tom, the role enabling him to exercise his dramatic ability to the fullest extent. He is ably supported by an all-star cast headed by Fay Halter, who is excellent as the understanding mother; by Virginia Weidler, as Tammie, Tom's sister and hero-worshiper; George Bancroft is tops as the stern father, who at times believes his son is really "addled." Eugene Pallette makes the most of a minor

role as the railroad conductor, Bill, another son, is a minor part. An extremely interesting and very timely March of Time feature "The Republic of Finland, 1919-1940," is unusually good. A new reel fills out a full bill to top entertainment.
