Roseburg high school's track and field athletes will play host to University high school of Eugene and Springfield Saturday, in a triangular track meet scheduled for Friday field at 1 o'clock. The meet was originally billed as a dual encounter against the Millers, but the last-minute entry of the Golden Tides necessitated a change in plans.

It will be the first test of strength of the season for Coach Jim Watts' children, although the sprinters and weight men had a taste of competition in the Hayward relays last weekend in Eugene where they placed second in the B division.

The squad is particularly strong in the shorter distances and the weight departments, with Jack Weaver, Hershel Byrd, Jim Finlay, Ted Thompson and Roger Olmschied, sprinters, leading the array, and big "Red" Carson and Jennings, weightmen, outstanding in their departments. The squad is fairly well balanced but the true strength of the team will not be known until the untimed material has had a chance to test itself under fire.

The meet will include every event except the javelin, for which the football throw for distance has been substituted. The events will be limited to three entrants from each school, but each member of the squad can enter as many different events as desired.

ATLANTA, Ga., April 18. (AP) In an unprecedented move, the national officials of the Ku Klux Klan ordered today removal of masks from helmets of the order's regalia, restricted the use of fiery crosses and placed a curb on parades and demonstrations.

The warlike action, first in the history of the Klan to bar the face-covering veils, came as the turbulent Klonellum, the organization's board of directors, wound up a five-day annual session.

Imperial Wizard James A. Colcott said the Klonellum reported a majority of the membership favored unmasking of the entire national Klan, which makes it illegal for klansmen to wear masks either
