They were so pleased with what was known then as Umpqua country that they located on a donation claim of 320 acres on the lower Calapooia on what is now known as the Starr farm. Mr. Manning states that the hills and valleys were covered with grass so high that when the oxen lay down they were lost to view.

Hawley Manning was born near Oakland, Oregon, in 1865. Mrs. Manning's father, Sampson Sutherland, crossed the plains in 1850, spending the winter near the

Luckiemute river in the Willamette valley coming to what is now known as Sutherland valley in 1851 and Mrs. Manning's mother crossed the plains by ox team in 1850. Mrs. Manning was born in Sutherland valley in 1870. Mr. and Mrs. Manning were the fourth in the Manning family to celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary.
