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Every state, county and city
official or board that handles
public money should publish at
regular intervals an accounting
of it, showing where and how
each dollar is spent. This is a
fundamental principle of democ-
ratic government.

THE largest job tackled by the
federal government during the
current year is the 1940 census.
The bureau of the census had sev-
eral years in which to organize and
prepare for it. It might be assumed
that, with so much time and
ample money with which to do the
job, it would be very well done in-
deed. Certainly a privately operat-
ed business could, under such cir-
cumstances, do a most efficient job.

But if the work over the entire
nation has been no better handled
than was the local census, the 1940
crew of managers will win no med-
als for efficiency.

Nothing herein is intended as
criticism of the Roseburg enumer-
ators. They have worked hard
and well. But the workers were
not paid enough. At the rate of
four cents a name "superman" him-
self would make little more than
wages. Such a rate might be sat-
isfactory in cities but not for a
community like ours. Partly as a
result of this fact, some of the
workers gave up early in the game.
The others carried on valiantly.

However, somewhere in the shuffle
one Roseburg district was for-
gotten entirely. This area is now
being counted.

As has been pointed out in this
column, it is important for many
reasons that our true and accu-
rate population be recorded in this
census. A great many industrial
and other decisions are based upon
census figures. Loan values, rates
of pay for WPA workers—all of
these things and many others, are
or may be affected by population
statistics.

The Roseburg chamber of com-
merce, aware of the necessity for
having a correct count, is cooperat-
ing in the "cleanup" work.

Today the chamber of commerce
has issued an appeal to people to
report to the chamber office the
names and, if possible, the ad-
dresses of people known to have
been missed by the enumerators.

The figures are supposed to be
complete before the first of the
month—so let the chamber of
