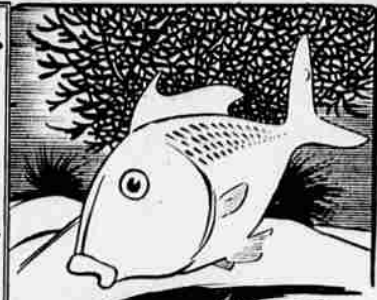

MARKET REPORTS

WOOL

BOSTON, April 20.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "There has been a considerable increase in the movement of pulled and scoured wools to the mills, and some speculative buying. The call for pulled wools in the grease has developed a firmer price structure and sales have been made at advances of two cents in both fine and medium grades. Easier levels are not expected to extend much further in secured wools."

"Contracting for new clip wools in advance of shearing in the northwest has stimulated a firmer tone in some quarters and a few clips have been taken over at fractionally better prices. Northern California wool has been sold at 75 cents, clean basis, and buying is reported from Nevada at 75 cents. In Wyoming two clips were taken over this week at prices figured to mean 78 to 80 cents, clean basis, delivered east. A sizable weight of late Texas wool has been moved at prices in the neighborhood of 82 cents, clean basis, delivered eastern points. Grease prices for the same wool range from 21 to 25 cents."

"Spot business on Summer street continues slow and irregular. There is some call for medium fleece wools, but supplies are held in a small compass. Good three eighths combing is figured at 25 cents, grease basis, and quarter blood possibly a cent less."

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G. O. P., Democrats Divide in Gains

SALEM, April 20.—(AP)—Republicans gained ground in Hood River and Wasco counties but yielded to Democrats in Lake and Tillamook counties in registration reports received by Secretary of State Snell today.

Its total registration raised to 5459 from 4967 for the 1938 primary election, Hood River county now lists 2915 Republicans and 2479 Democrats. Republican registration increased by 490, Democratic by 41. Wasco county registration dropped from 6348 to 6323, with Republicans gaining 364 voters for a total of 4471, and Democrats losing 381, dropping to 1809.

In Lake county, however, Democrats gained 91, for 1434, while Republicans dropped down 103 to 1365. Total registration for the county was reported at 1812. Tillamook county's registration listed 5803 voters, six below the 1938 total, with 3439 Republicans and 2299 Democrats. Republican lists lost 13 while the Democratic column gained 23.

New Lima Bean Winning Approval

There is no crop more satisfactory to the home gardener than Lima beans. They are so delicious and so easily grown, that it is a mistake to forget them in planning your vegetable plot.

Until this year one had to choose between two types of bush limas, the large seeded type, such as Fordhook, and the small seeded type, such as Henderson. The large kind was difficult to grow in some sections, where temperatures were high; it had to have plenty of room in the row, and while its yield was good, it was not as good as the Henderson type.

The small seeded type, on the other hand, would grow anywhere, in less space, and produced an abundant crop of small pods filled with small beans. They were delicious, but it was natural for gardeners who grew them to wish they were larger.

Prof. W. A. Huchson of the University of Illinois set for himself the task of breeding a larger bean of the heavy yielding Henderson strain, and this year he won a silver medal in the All-America trials, for a variety which the judges considered had made great progress toward that goal. This year's Lima bean in the name it has been given, it grows 12 to 16 inches tall, is early and prolific like the Henderson type, and bears as well, while the pods are larger, with larger beans.

25 Die, 100 Injured in N. Y. Central Train Crash

man came to rest on its right side. From each several bodies were removed.

The dining car was tipped at a 75-degree angle, a mass of wreckage. Two more Pullmans tilted precariously near the edge of the barge canal.

The dead, the injured, car cushions, clothing and personal effects were strewn along the right of way. Feet of some of the victims protruded from the wreckage. Crumpled metal, ties and rails gave a jumbled appearance to the ghastly scene.

Survivors struggled back and forth looking for friends, relatives and luggage. Many persons grabbed blankets from the Pullman berths and huddled in groups against the freezing temperature. Communication lines torn down by the plunging locomotive were entwined in the debris.

Identification Difficult

State Police Lieutenant John Roman said 22 bodies were recovered in addition to those of the engineer and fireman. Identification of the victims was made difficult because most of them were in sleeping attire. Their clothing and luggage, only clues to identity, were lost in the wreckage. In addition, many bodies were so badly mangled identification was virtually impossible.

Hospitals in the area were jammed with the injured and ambulances and physicians rushed to the scene from miles around. Cots were placed along the highway and the four-track line for those less seriously hurt.

"Third Termite" Rapped By Candidate Dewey

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif., April 20.—(AP)—Thomas E. Dewey, Republican presidential aspirant, greeted a California audience here today with a declaration that "we have termites at home to hell—third termites."

"What we have to decide is whether we shall continue to slide on a toboggan greased with the money from taxpayers' pockets, and what is worse, with the money from the pockets of our grandchildren," Dewey said.

"After all, what can we expect of an administration headed by a president who in 1932 declared that this country was mature economically—that we are too old to get well? This is precisely what is wrong. Are we too old and lazy to get well?"

"The only thing to do apparently is to borrow from our grand children. We must decide if this is true. Are we all through or are we just beginning to develop?"

Corpse of Missing Negro Girl Found; Slaying Seen

LOS ANGELES, April 20.—(AP)—Dorothy Lee Gordon, 9-year-old negro girl missing since March 5, has been found dead in a shallow grave in a field a quarter of a mile from Loyola university campus here.

Police said a white man lurched Dorothy into his automobile. She apparently was killed, the officers said.

Major Battle Impends in Norway Campaign

men, had been landed at three widely separated coastal points and that the allies apparently were planning a thrust at the German-occupied port of Trondheim, key to central Norway.

A British report said British and French soldiers reached Norway without a single life being lost, which the Press association, British news agency, hailed as proving "more than anything else the complete control the allied fleets have over sea routes."

Allies' Purpose Seen

The points at which the new allied troops landings in Norway were reported were Namsos, 100 miles north of Trondheim; Molde, approximately the same distance south, and Laerdal, which is 150 miles further down the coast and 90 miles inland at the head of Sogne fjord.

The divisions landed at Namsos and Molde apparently were assigned the task of cutting off the German forces at Trondheim, in the vicinity of which British and German troops were reported to have met yesterday in a series of skirmishes.

Travelers who crossed into Sweden today said the Germans suffered heavy losses when they were repulsed in a battle for Elverum, north of Oslo. Earlier reports said Elverum had fallen to the Germans.

Nazis Threaten Defenders

There were two German warnings to the Norwegians to stop their resistance, one a "final" demand by Gen. von Falkenhorst, commander-in-chief of the army of occupation, backed by a threat of "dreadful" punishment if they refused.

Von Falkenhorst's demand came as he marked Hitler's birthday by commencing the death sentences of Norwegians deemed since the invasion; at the same time, in Berlin, the Norwegians were told Germany intended to end their "purposeless resistance" as quickly as possible.

ISIR, German news agency, reported that a British transport had been sunk by German air bombs yesterday which also scored hits on a British cruiser and two transports.

On the trade front, Britain informed soviet Russia she was willing to discuss a trade agreement, negotiations for which originally were broken off when Germany and Russia reached a non-aggression pact before the European war started.

The Germans meanwhile, engaged in extending their grip on southern Norway, were estimated to have increased their expeditionary force to between 60,000 and 80,000 men—largely through reinforcements transported into the country by planes.

Nazis Get Wheat, No Oil

From Berlin, celebrating Adolf Hitler's 51st birthday, came words of defiance and predictions of ultimate victory, bolstered by reports of a new trade treaty with Rumania, strengthening the reich's economic position.

Under the terms of the agreement Rumania—possessor of vast wealth in the form of oil and wheat—was understood to have granted Germany new trade concessions in return for war materials and fighting planes.

Most important feature of the accord was Rumania's agreement to

fulfill wheat contracts signed with Germany prior to the Bucharest government's imposition of an embargo on all wheat exports. Greatly coveted facilities also were accorded Germany to promote trade between the two countries.

Swiss Jail "Borers"

The Swiss army announced arrest of an army lieutenant colonel and others charged with espionage in behalf of "a certain foreign power" which high sources said was Germany. Because of the officer's high rank, much importance was attached to apprehension of the ring, although the army denied reports that other high officers were involved.

On the western front there was a flurry of activity as French and German patrols fought scattered engagements and the rival air forces extended their reconnaissance flights.

On the British home front peace was shattered by an unexplained explosion in a North London munitions factory which killed five workmen and injured 15 others. An immediate inquiry was launched to determine the cause of the blast, which shook the entire neighborhood.

Balkans Still Restless

Unrest continued to grow in the Balkans as rumors of an impending German invasion of Hungary caused many British and French residents to begin a hurried exodus from Budapest.

In Yugoslavia, police, who announced yesterday they had nipped a plot to depose the government and turn the country over to the nazis, continued a nation-wide roundup of persons suspected of sedition. Former Premier Stoyadinovic, accused a "friend of Germany," was held under close guard in an inaccessible mountain chalet.

With Britain and soviet Russia making overtures toward trade talks to ease one sore spot, France made a gesture toward Germany's non-belligerent ally and hostile critic of the allies, Italy.

Premier Paul Reynaud told the French senate's foreign affairs committee France was looking to ward a "Mediterranean entente" with Italy and also with Spain, whose nationalist government received German and Italian aid in the civil war.
