refrain from working there. Lower Courts Reversed. Carlson was sentenced to serve 12 days in jail or pay a \$25 fine. His conviction was upheld by the California superior court for Shasta county.

In the Alabama case, the statute prohibited picketing "for the purpose of hindering, delaying or interfering with or injuring any lawful business or enterprise of another."

It also outlawed picketing "without just cause or legal excuse," near a place of business for the purpose of inducing other persons not to trade with or work for the business.

Thornhill was fined \$100. His conviction was sustained by the Alabama court of appeals. Speech Freedom Upheld. The supreme court, in its action today, held that "publicizing the fact of a labor dispute in a peaceful way through appropriate means, whether by pamphlet, by word of mouth or by banner," may not be abridged by a state.

"The freedom of speech and of the press guaranteed by the constitution," Justice Murphy said, "embraces at the least the liberty to discuss publicly and truthfully all matters of public concern without previous restraint or fear of subsequent punishment."

Two-Headed Trout Give Inspiration to Anglers

YOSEMITE, Calif. (AP)—Two-headed trout swimming in their own private tank at the state fish hatchery inspired fishermen to suggest stocking streams with two-headed game fish.

There would be that many more bites to a fish, they reasoned, and would double the chances of catching one. If one head didn't like the bait, the other might.

J. W. Gudger, an authority on the subject, explained that "when the oxygen supply during early development is not abundant a great many twins and double trout specimens are found to occur."

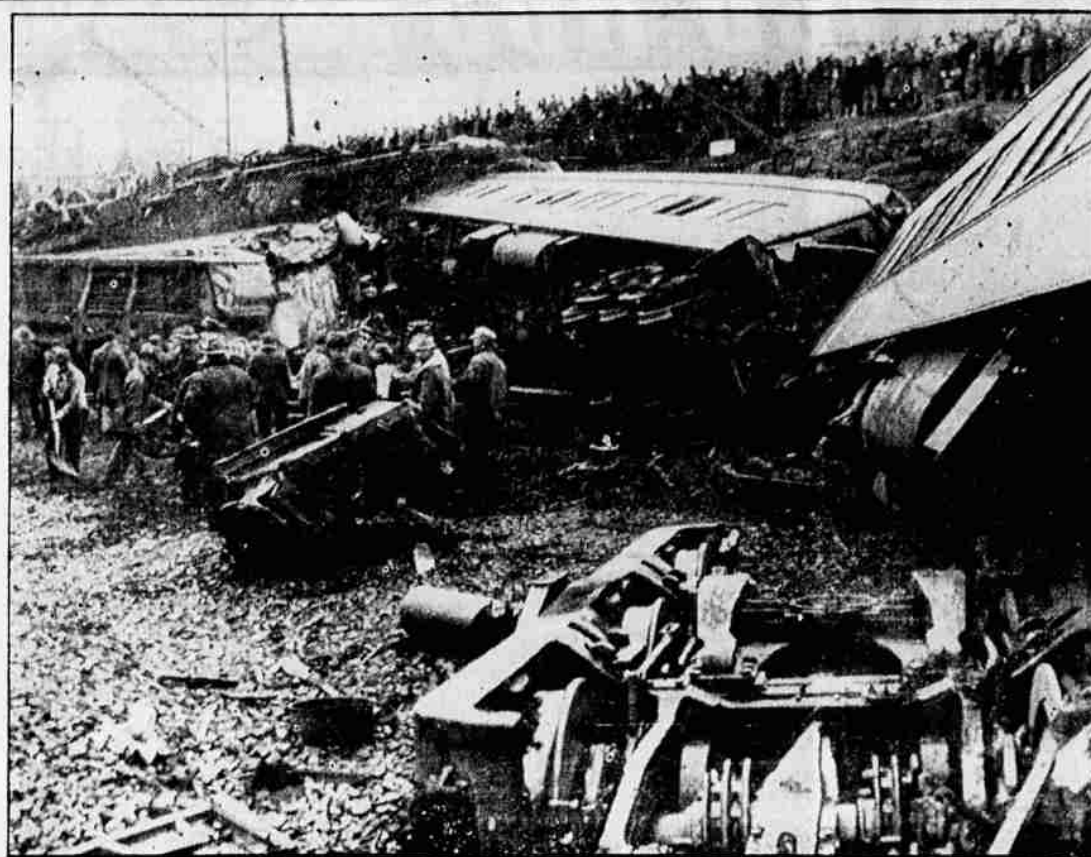

Twisted Cars Are Death Trap in Rail Wreck

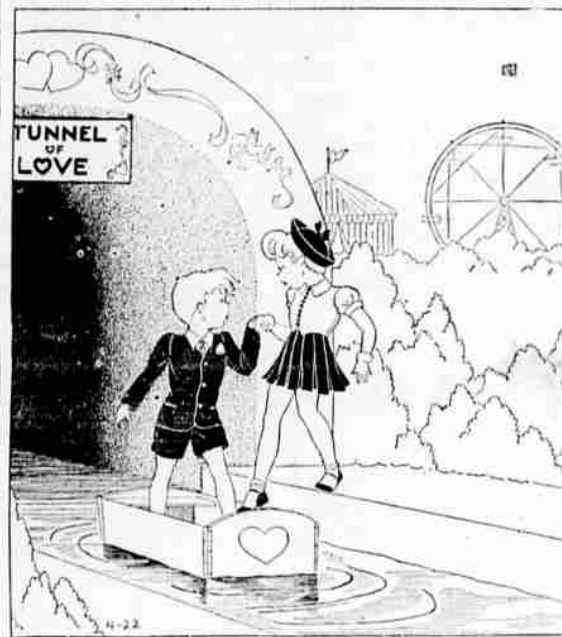

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Nazi-Held Narvik to Face Bombardment by Britons

from Oslo were reported to have reached Elverum after traveling more than 150 miles by rail from the west coast port of Andalsnes, which is 100 miles south of Trondheim.

The Norwegian location here announced early today that the swiftly moving allied column, supported by tanks, had attacked the Germans at Elverum after dislodging the invaders from Hamar, 20 miles to the west.

(In Berlin, German sources denied the British had recaptured Hamar.) There were unconfirmed reports that the British actually had occupied Elverum.

Nazi Roid Swedes. Meantime Sweden protested strongly to Berlin today against incursion by Nazi warplanes over her territory and asked measures to prevent repetition of flights which "yesterday were especially numerous and grave."

Faced with a steadily expanding battlezone next door in Norway, Sweden already had taken sweeping precautions to prevent the conflict from infringing on her neutrality.

The Swedish protest was lodged in Berlin after Sweden shot down one German plane on Swedish soil and fired warning shots at others. Two German planes made forced landings on Gotland island, in the Baltic. The crews were interned after they turned their planes.

Danish Base Raided. British planes made a second-wave raid on German-occupied Denmark, bombing the Aalborg airbase in an effort to cripple Germany's air transport system which ferries troops to invaded Norway, only 100 miles from Aalborg.

Germany said that neither raid resulted in any serious damage. The British claimed, however, their second air raid in Aalborg was highly successful, asserting that numerous buildings and grounded planes had been hit.

One British plane failed to return from the second raid, the air ministry declared, saying this attack, too, had caused numerous fires. The British also synchronized air attacks over the weekend on Stavanger and Kristiansund, Norwegian coastal towns where German expeditionary forces have been landed.

LONDON, April 22.—(AP)—A well-informed source said that British and Norwegian troops had joined "at several places" and that joint action in eastern Norway near Lake Mjosen had been "extremely successful."

This informant said that answers could be expected in a few weeks to the much-debated military questions: Can a force be maintained in a hostile country by air communications alone? Can troops be landed if the enemy has temporary and local air superiority?

So far, he said, the answer to the second question has been satisfactory from the British viewpoint.

Indication that the Germans expected no resistance in Norway, he said, was seen in their attempts to land parachute soldiers and their dispatch of a small force all the way to Narvik, on the northern Norwegian coast, Germans on the whole Atlantic seaboard around "the nose" from the Skagerrak, he said, virtually have been isolated from all except air communications.

House Group Eyes Charge of Relief Fund Juggling. WASHINGTON, April 22.—(AP)—In secret session, the house subcommittee handling the \$975,000,000 WPA appropriation bill discussed today charges that some of the money previously given the relief agency was mis-

handled. The charges, contained in a report made by J. O'Connor Roberts, committee counsel, have not been made public, but Chairman Woodrum (D, Va.) said that in general they alleged excessive travel expenses and administrative costs, WPA work done on private property and improper certifications of persons for WPA work.

Budget Savings Seem Impossible

WASHINGTON, April 22.—(AP)—Influential lawmakers predicted today that congress would appropriate about \$7,500,000,000 at this session, resulting in little if any savings, under President Roosevelt's budget estimates.

Although the president told reporters last week that it seemed likely congress might cut about \$200,000,000 off the 1941 expenditures which he proposed last January, some senators said this now appeared impossible.

The president's budget estimates were so drawn that, if congress stayed within them and raised \$400,000,000 in new taxes, the treasury could remain within the \$15,000,000,000 statutory debt limit in the fiscal year ending July 1, 1941.

Developments since then, however, have indicated that there will be no tax bill in this pre-election session.

Still to be considered are the \$975,000,000 relief bill and last-minute appropriations which may be put into a final deficiency bill.

democratic national committee. He said that Dewey has "one foreign policy for the Atlantic seaboard and another . . . for the middle west."

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Then, as if to indicate that there had been some coordination of democratic speeches on foreign policy, Postmaster General Farley told a Boston audience last night that the record of the Roosevelt administration in keeping the nation out of war was a "remarkably outstanding" one.

Farley, who had announced his unreserved candidacy for the democratic presidential nomination, voiced approval of the trade agreements program in charge of Secretary Hull. There has been much talk of a Hull-Farley ticket.
