

### Man, Wife Bandits Draw Long Terms

PORTLAND, April 23.—(AP)—A man and his wife, convicted bank robbers, were sentenced to long terms in prison today by Federal Judge James A. Fee.

William Jones, 32, Woodburn, Ore., drew 20 years on two charges and his wife, Myrtle, 28, 15 years on one charge of complicity.

Jones pleaded guilty to robbing the Canby Union bank November 9, 1939, and the St. Paul State bank February 26. His wife was convicted of complicity in the Canby robbery after testifying her husband coerced her into the crime.

The Canby robbery netted them \$1,000. Jones was shot and captured by the St. Paul cashier.

After hearing his sentence, Jones dropped wearily to a court room bench beside his wife, who was wiping away tears, and said: "Goodbye, kid."

"I believe the woman was the moving factor," Judge Fee said, referring to the Canby robbery. "I do not believe the other defendant would have done it without her. She is more dangerous than her companion."

He then turned to Jones and said: "Although I do not think this man was the moving factor, he was not man enough to control his own affairs."

The maximum sentence for Jones would have been 45 years and for his wife, 20 years.
