Major Leaguers Have Swat Orgies

The world champion New York Yankees yesterday unleashed their home run barrage against the Philadelphia Phillies and won 9-1 although their 11 hits were only one more than Red Ruffing gave the A's.

But the Yankees' lot included two homers by Rolfe and two others by Henrich and Gordon while the A's could muster only one by Wally Moses.

The Cleveland Indians beat out the St. Louis Browns by Mack, 6-1, and took over first place in the American league.

The Washington Senators outbit the Boston Red Sox 1-0 and thus were able to chalk up their first victory of the season 9-6. Seven pitchers, including Letty Grove, paraded to and from the mound.

Tigers, Giants Win

Even the games that approxi-

mated pitching duels were broken up by the hitters. In the Detroit Tigers' 2-1 triumph over the Chicago White Sox the margin of victory was a homer in the sixth by York. This was Tommy Bridges' second decision of the young season and he made it stick by scattering five hits and striking out seven.

The New York Giants scored a similar sort of a victory over the Philadelphia Phillies, 5-2, with Rookie Young breaking up the struggle in the eighth by means of a three-run homer.

The Pittsburgh Pirates dropped out of the tie for first in the National league as the Chicago Cubs triumphed 9-4. The Pirates got 11 hits off Bill Lee and four Pittsburgh pitchers allowed one loss.

The Brooklyn Dodgers took a wild, snarling struggle from the Boston Bees 8-6, coming from behind in the eighth after Wyatt had given up five runs in the first three innings to squander the four runs Brooklyn gave him in the first inning.

The Cincinnati Reds and St. Louis Cardinals were idle.
