

Park Project's Progress Discussed at Forum Here

Plans for the development of a city park on the two-acre site recently set aside for that purpose by the city council were discussed Wednesday at the weekly forum luncheon of the Roseburg chamber of commerce. The park will be located at the north end of Rose street, adjoining Deer creek, and the Pacific highway, on the property now occupied by the city barn.

H. D. Palmer, secretary of the city park committee, told of the progress made to date and an open discussion followed.

H. O. Pargeter was appointed to make arrangements for good will caravans to various communities throughout the county. The first caravan, it was decided, will visit

Reedsport and Gardiner. A definite date has not yet been fixed.

Jobless Insurance Board Examinations to Be Held

Announcement was made today by the Oregon State Unemployment Compensation commission that examinations will be conducted in Roseburg in the near future to prepare a register from which to fill future vacancies in various offices. Positions for which examinations will be given include manager, employment officer, receptionist, field auditor, junior accountant, accounting clerk, and telephone operator. The examinations will be conducted at the junior high school building in Roseburg. The exact time has not yet been announced. Similar examinations are to be given in Portland, Salem, Klamath Falls and La Grande.

Applicants must be citizens of the United States and residents of the state of Oregon. Application

County Health

The chamber of commerce of the United States in cooperation with the American Public Health association has announced awards for the 1939 city health conservation contest and the 1939 rural health conservation contest. The rural health contest in Canada, sponsored by the Canadian Public Health association, and the American Public Health association also announced its winning units. Dr. W. S. Rankin, chairman of the committee of public health experts in charge of selecting the winning city and county health departments, stated that these contests are one of the most effective means of furthering adequate health protection and health promotion services ever devised in the United States.

The competent manner in which a community is meeting its health problems is the basis upon which the awards are made. This does not necessarily mean that awards are made to the healthiest communities. A group of public health experts from all parts of the country carefully appraise each participating city and county. Each community is graded on what measures it takes: (1) To provide and safeguard its water supply; (2) to furnish adequate and safe sewerage disposal; (3) to reduce infant and maternal deaths; (4) to combat tuberculosis and syphilis; (5) to protect its citizens against other communicable diseases; (6) to insure healthy children; (7) to protect and safeguard its milk and other foods; (8) to promote effective cooperation with its physicians and dentists in furnishing necessary services to all those who need them; and (9) to enlarge and improve its lay understanding of ways and means of preventing sickness and death and of maintaining good health.

The city health contest is financed by a group of life insurance companies. The rural health contest is financed by the W. K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek, Mich.

In Oregon the winner is Wasco county. Awards of merit go to Jackson county and Marion county.
