Umpqua Club Adds Five Solo Fliers

Instructor Ernest Sink Called to Seattle by CAA For Special Training Course.

The Umpqua Flying club at Roseburg, claimed to be the largest private and un-sponsored flying group in the Pacific northwest, today brought its list of solo fliers to 32. Now fliers who experienced their first solo flights this week are Warren Deholt, Alfred Kolen and Wallace Robertson, Roseburg; Ross Brown, Canas Valley and Willard Cokeram, Sutherlin.

The club, still in its first year, now has about 60 members, and has purchased a second training plane, which will be put into service late in May after being flown from the fastest person to ride in the club's present training plane was "Paddy" Sink, who was four weeks old Thursday. Sink was taken for a ride by his father, Ernest Sink, club instructor. Penny Sink, three-year-old daughter of the instructor, who also made her first flight at the age of four weeks, now has more than 60 hours in the air and can keep a plane in level flight, her father reports.

Sink to Get Special Course
 Mr. Sink left today for Seattle in response to a call from the civil aeronautics authority that he has been selected for two weeks of special training. Local club members are hopeful that this unexpected summons means that the organization is to be recognized by the federal government as a part of its training program for civilian fliers and that aid in financing instruction will be given.

At present the federal government is sponsoring classes in numerous colleges and universities and has provided aid as well for a limited number of private clubs in non-college communities. Efforts have been made for several months to secure federal aid for the local club.

Mr. Sink reports he has been advised he will receive 10 hours of flight instruction together with many hours of ground work.

To Follow U. S. Program
 After November 1 of this year, Mr. Sink says he has been advised, all instructors will be required to give uniform instruction and will follow a teaching program laid down by federal authorities. All instructors will be re-rated and must have received training which will enable them to put the uniform program into practice.

Mr. Sink states that all future students will be taught by identical methods by all instructors, and in accordance with a federal pattern fitting in with the more advanced training schedule of service branches of the government.

Mr. Sink will renew his instructor's rating while in Seattle, he reports. During his absence there will be no instruction for students, but arrangements have been made whereby solo fliers will be permitted to use the club's training plane.

Determined to win the state junior drum corps contest, in which they fell short of first place last year by only three-tenths of a point, the junior drum corps of Roseburg is making extensive preparations for the appearance at the state convention at Marshfield, it was reported today.

The lodge at its regular meeting held Tuesday voted to equip the corps with new uniforms. New bugles and other equipment recently were secured. A committee has been appointed to arrange transportation of the corps to Marshfield for the convention to be held June 27, 28 and 29.
