

Oregon Industry Heads Will Confer

Rally of Business to Support Private Enterprise in New Decade Dated at Portland.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 26.—Industry's mobilization for the understanding of private enterprise, initiated recently through a nation-wide broadcast by H. W. Prentiss, Jr., president of the National Association of Manufacturers, will be given added impetus here with the Oregon Industrial Leadership conference, to be held Monday.

May 20, at the Multnomah hotel, Portland. This was announced today by T. Harry Banfield, president of the Iron Fireman Manufacturing Co., Portland, and director of the National Association of Manufacturers.

The meeting will be sponsored jointly by the N. A. M. and Columbia Empire Industries, Inc. The conference committee lists thirty industrial leaders of Oregon, this being supplemented by a special committee on arrangements. Mr. Banfield will act as chairman of both.

Purpose of the conference will be to rally business to the support of the private enterprise system that has "made us the world's greatest nation." The formal announcement asks the question, "will 1940's executives accept the

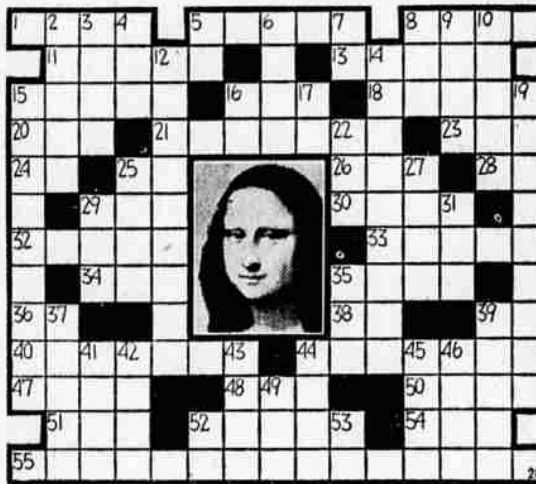

HEPPNER, Ore., April 25.—(AP)—The Rev. Robert Carl Young, 55, pastor of the Methodist church since 1936, died of a heart attack yesterday. He came from the midwest in 1910 and served for many years in Oregon and Washington churches.

PORTLAND, April 25.—(AP)—Multnomah, the largest voting county in Oregon, counted 2,559 plurality in 1936, the highest registration figures released today.

Of the 176,599 registered voters, 88,791 are democrats and 87,808 republicans. Other party registrations, including six communists, totaled 2,271.

PORTLAND, April 25.—(AP)—Hopkins Jenkins, 64, veteran educator, resigned today as Jefferson high school principal. His retirement from a post accepted in 1939 will become effective June 8, Jenkins, who has taught hundreds of Portland residents, has been associated with the public school system since 1902 and was named "first citizen" in 1934.

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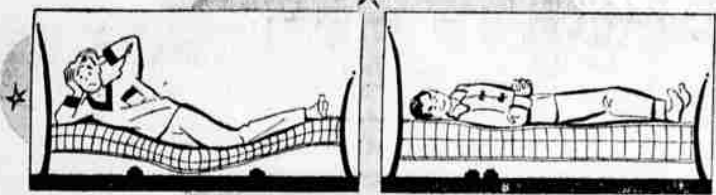
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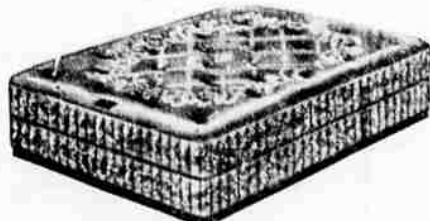
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
