NEW YORK, April 29.—(AP)—Promoter Mike Jacobs announced today that he had signed Champion Joe Louis and Arturo Godoy of Chile to meet in a 15-round fight at Yankee stadium here on June 29.

Louis defeated the South American heavyweight in their first meeting here last February 9, but failed to score a knockout.

Under terms of the agreement for the coming fight, \$25,000 will be withheld from Godoy's end of the purse and placed in escrow as a guarantee that Godoy, in the event he wins the title, will meet Louis in a return bout within 60 days.

German Drive Meeting Stronger Resistance

German had attacked heavily from the air the towns of Andalsnes and Molde, allied landing places below Trondheim, but gave no details. In Gudbrandsdalen, the war office announced, the position was unchanged.

Bitter Battle Impends

Thrusting over snowy mountain roads the Germans were reported to have reached the railroad linking Dombas and Storöen over the weekend at a point where British troops met them in the first round of a battle which may decide control of southern Norway.

Both sides rushed up reinforcements, presenting a bitter battle. A lightning force advance enabled the Germans to strike at the railway.

On other Norwegian fronts the Germans were said to have halted and started digging in against allied attempts to dislodge them.

Britain announced three German supply ships had been sunk and said more allied troops had made landings at Andalsnes, despite strenuous German efforts to forestall them.

Claims Conflict.

The British issued a communique denying German claims that four cruisers and 11 transports had been sunk or severely damaged in the last 48 hours but acknowledged one traveler had been sunk and another set afire by bombs.

Germany said the British warships had been damaged off Narvik and Central Norway.

In Rome, meanwhile, it was announced that Dino Alfieri, regarded there as a pro-German fascist, had been named ambassador to Germany to succeed Bernardino Attolico. The two envoys exchanged posts. Alfieri taking Alfieri's former assignment as Italian ambassador in the Vatican.

Norwegians Stand Firm.

The embattled Norwegian government, from secret headquarters, issued a statement thanking the

British, French and Polish governments for their aid and declared resistance against Germany shall continue "until the usurpers have been hurled out of the country."

Halvdan Kobi, Norway's foreign minister, and Carl J. Hambro, president of parliament, declared untrue German allegations that with Norwegian consent the allies had planned to land troops in Norway before the German invasion.

With both Germany and the allies concentrating on Norway, the western front remained quiet.

NEGRO CONGRESS ADDED TO J. L. LEWIS' SUPPORTERS

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(AP)—John L. Lewis, seeking to make labor's non-partisan league a factor in the 1940 campaign, added the national negro congress today to its list of supporters.

The negro organization accepted Lewis' invitation last night over the protest of its president, A. Philip Randolph of New York, who refused to stand for reelection as a result.

Labor's non-partisan league generally is considered the political arm of the CIO. Lewis heads both organizations.

Earlier, Lewis won a promise of political cooperation with the league from the American youth congress.

In accepting Lewis' bid to political activity, the negro congress declared that the negro worker long had awaited "the extended hand of organized labor."

With only scattered "noes," it adopted, too, a resolution accusing the Roosevelt administration of abandoning a policy of "welfare of the people" in favor of "mobilization of America's resources of war."

OREGON COMMONWEALTH BACKS THIRD TERM IDEA

SALEM, April 29.—(AP)—Two hundred delegates from 20 Oregon counties yesterday put the Oregon Commonwealth federation behind Senator Robert M. La Follette or Wisconsin for vice-president.

Senator Burton K. Wheeler of Montana was rejected.

The federation approved a third term for President Roosevelt with only scattering of "no" votes but failed to endorse Flavel Temple or Howard Latourette, both of Multnomah county, for democratic national committeeman, or Bruce Spaulding, Dallas attorney, for attorney general. The federation also declined to endorse Willis Mahoney of Portland as delegate to

the national convention.

The \$40 old-age pension bill, unemployment compensation amendments and the farmers' wine bill—designed to limit alcoholic content of wine to 14 per cent—also drew federation approval.

unbly enjoining enforcement of the wage order.

Justice Black said in the decision that the federal government "enjoins the unrestricted power to produce its own supplies, to determine those with whom it will deal, and to fix the terms and conditions upon which it will make need-of purchases."

Another Case to Be Reviewed

The court agreed to review a controversy involving the liability of officers of a labor union to production under the anti-trust laws. In this case, the eastern Missouri federal district court dismissed

anti-trust indictments against William L. Hutchison and three other officers of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America.

Justice Murphy, former attorney general, did not participate in the action on the Hutchison case in which the union officials were charged with conspiring to restrain the interstate trade of Anheuser-Busch, Inc. St. Louis beer manufacturer.

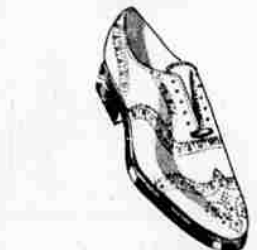
