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Every state, county and city official or board that handles public money should publish at regular intervals an accounting of it, showing where and how each dollar is spent. This is a fundamental principle of democratic government.

ABOUT once each year attention is called in this column to the work that is done, year in and year out, by the singing organization known as the Roseburg Men's Glee club. It happens that attention is usually directed to this group about concert time. It is again that time, for tomorrow night the club will present its annual spring concert in the Indian theatre.

The Roseburg Men's Glee club membership includes men from many and varied businesses and professions. The men have just one thing in common—they enjoy singing and they especially enjoy singing together in a group. They turn out for rehearsal once each week, with time off for vacation in the summer months. Thursday night, every week of the school year is Glee club night—and no excuses, they say.

The regular rehearsals are intensively for the purpose of preparing for public appearances but the fact of the matter is, and the members will all admit it, that they belong to the club because they enjoy the weekly meetings—concert or no concert.

But a musical organization must have music and music for so many—some 30 or more—is pretty expensive. The members of the group pay dues or membership fees but even that is not enough, not by any means, to defray the expense of a year's music. Hence the annual concert is sort of a necessity as a means of raising a little money with which to carry on. Other than the annual concert, however, the Roseburg Men's Glee club gives frequently and willingly of its services. Next week, for instance, the singers will go to Riddle and sing for the benefit of the Riddle grange. The club has appeared on such missions in Glendale, Canyonville, at Clide and has made numerous appearances for civic events in Roseburg.

It should be noted also that next week, May 5 through the 11th, is National Music week. The national committee urges two keynotes for the observance this year: one being that American music should be featured wherever and whenever possible. The other point called especially to the attention for the 1940 observance is the slogan "Support Local Group Activities." The appeal in this slogan will be made nationally over the radio, in national publications and in newspapers. The people of our country need no special urging in this direction for local musical organizations always seem to be well supported—but a word of encouragement is never amiss.

There is no more exalted human endeavor than the production of good music. Not everyone is given a talent for giving enjoyment to others by playing a musical instrument or by singing. But everyone may enjoy, appreciate, and support musical endeavors. Music week is a means of placing national emphasis upon this fact.

First Girl Scout Unaware of Honor

Ultimate Information Merely Annoyed Daisy Gordon of Georgia, Now Very Active.

(NEA Service Staff Correspondent) NEW YORK—The young woman who was the first girl scout in the United States became so without either knowing it or accepting the honor. In fact, when Aunt Juliette Low, who founded the first troop, in Savannah, Ga., in 1912, informed her niece that she, Daisy Gordon was elected as scout number one, young Miss Gordon was "a little annoyed."

It was not until 1914 that the reluctant Miss Gordon became an eager, active member of the Carleton troop of the girl scouts. The scouts were originally called "guides" after the Scottish Girl Guides, on whom Juliette Low modeled her American troops.

Even before she became an active scout, however, Miss Gordon was learning from Aunt "Daisy" Low the principles of scouting—a good deed daily, preparedness, good citizenship and first aid.

Her first attempt at first aid might have been fatal. A superstitious negro workman on her family's Georgia plantation, who had kicked in the head by a mule, was rubbed the wound with cobwebs and soot to stop the bleeding.

The helpful young girl guide, never having heard of germs, rushed indoors, grabbed a roll of bandage, trailed it through the mud of a germ-infested yard, wiped and bound the negro's wound with the bandage. It was an early attempt at service!

The girls' first uniforms consisted of dark blue denim middie blouses with light blue ties, pleated skirts, and "hideous, round felt hats."

How Different in Early Days. "I cannot help contrasting our activities in those early days of scouting with those of today," said Miss Gordon, now Mrs. Samuel C. Lawrence, a girl scout council, W. Va., member of the Charleston, W. Va., girl scout council.

"We began every meeting by reciting the promise and laws. Then the badges we intended to work for were discussed and we did a little work to that end."

After that the girls played games, most often basketball. In those days it was a question of killing time by scouting, as opposed to the present-day problem of finding time for it.

"The remarkable thing about girl scouting, however," said Mrs. Lawrence, "is that in 28 years the actual fundamentals of the movement have not changed. The basic ideal of giving girls a standard to live by, teaching them friendliness, co-operation and citizenship, is the same today as it was in 1912."
