

Eagles Program To Honor Mothers

Mother's day will be celebrated by Roseburg aerie, Fraternal Order of Eagles, with special exercises at 7:30 p. m., May 7 at Eagles' hall. The principal speaker on the program will be District Attorney J. V. Long, a prominent member of the fraternity. The public is invited to attend.

This annual commemoration of Mother's day is a long-standing tradition in the Fraternal Order of Eagles, declared worthy President Wallace A. Rapp. Two years before congress passed the second Sunday in May as Mother's day, the grand aerie, or national governing body of the fraternity, enacted legislation providing that all aeries in the jurisdiction observe Mother's day with appropriate ceremonies.

The interest of the fraternity in Mother's day dates back to February 7, 1901, the day on which one of its leaders, Frank E. Herring, now editor of the Eagle magazine and chairman of the Eagles' national old age pension commission—delivered the first-known public plea for a nation-wide, Mother's day.

In 1925, the American War Mothers issued this statement: "The Fraternal Order of Eagles was the first organization to conduct a national campaign for the observance of Mother's day."

Advertising Right Of Dentists Upheld

PORTLAND, Ore., May 2.—(AP)—Circuit Judge James W. Crawford ruled yesterday that the state board of dental examiners can not prohibit credit dentists' advertising.

In a suit brought by Dr. Harry Semler, Portland and Salem dentist, Judge Crawford permanently enjoined the board from enforcing the following rules:

Prohibiting press or radio statements concerning facilities of a certain office, such as "scientifically equipped."

Prohibiting emphasizing any phase of dentistry.

Prohibiting the advertising of any phase or specialty of dentistry unless practice is so limited.

Such advertisements, the judge said, were not "of a character tending to deceive or mislead the public," providing the statements were true in fact.

Advertisements stressing equipment, the judge ruled, "merely describe the particular equipment and only by the most remote of inferences can it be said that the negative implication appears that others are not similarly equipped and organized."

He also held advertising "terms of payment," "easy terms" and "credit dentistry" could not be held in violation of a statutory prohibition against advertising prices for professional services.

Other rules not discussed in the opinion were sustained by the court as within the board's authority.

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Vitamin E Held Deafness Remedy

WASHINGTON—Deafness and roaring noises in the ears may be corrected by eating large amounts of vitamin E, the fertility vitamin.

Dr. Emanuel M. Josephson of New York City told members of the Acoustical Society of America that while deafness and fertility had nothing in common, the vitamin was effective for both body deficiencies.

The deafness results from a lack of creatine, one of the substances normally present in the muscles. Insufficient creatine also causes the weakening disease known as myasthenia gravis and other conditions in which the nerves fail to actuate the muscles normally.

"The type of progressive deafness associated with roaring ear noises occurs in persons suffering from vitamin E deficiency," Dr. Josephson said.

He added that "it can be relieved permanently by the administration of vitamin E," which is obtained from wheat germ oil, together with a rich diet furnishing adequate amounts of creatine to the muscles.

Under the vitamin E treatment the churning, or ear roaring, clears up completely and the deafness improves materially," he told the society. Its action, he explained, is to improve the kidneys and halt the loss of creatine so that enough of the substance remains to allow the muscles to perform normally.
