From Jungle Boy to Schoolboy



Stranger than the fiction of Kipling's Mowgli, "The Jungle Boy" is the story of this young El Salvador Indian boy. In 1933 farmers of the Sonoran province captured, after many months' search, and a severe fight, a strange jungle "animal." The "beast" was a 5-year-old boy. Farmers guessed his parents died when he was two; that he lived on fish and berries, killing jungle enemies, like poisonous snakes, with his bare hands. Today Ruben Marroquin, now 11, and thoroughly "civilized," still returns to the jungle where, as seen at left, he exhibits ape-like prowess in tree climbing. But he always returns to school (right), where he is rated a good scholar.
