

Two Negroes Held In Double Murder

STOCKTON, Calif., May 6.—(AP)—District Attorney Clowdsley said today he might go direct to the grand jury with requests for murder indictments against two negro executives jailed on suspicion of slaying Nathan Chinchio, 23, and Dorothy Woolter, 19.

The negroes, Dewey Clark, 29, and Henry Jones, 38, were seized in Fresno Saturday night, and vehemently denied slaying the throats of the young couple whose bodies were found in a Stockton wheat field Friday. Miss Woolter had been assaulted, medical examiners said.

Feeling was bitter, but there was no talk of violence.

The two negroes, placed in widely separated cells in San Joaquin county jail, protested they had not been in Stockton or Tracy for years, although a garage mechanic at Tracy identified them as occupants of Chinchio's stolen car a week ago Sunday night.

Clowdsley said the negroes, both released within the last five months from a Kern county prison camp, told conflicting stories of their whereabouts the night Chinchio and Miss Woolter died.

Chinchio and the girl left friends on the evening of April 26 in the youth's car. They were not again seen until their bodies, gagged and bound hand and foot, were found by a motorist.

Walter B. Gnyon, mechanic, said that shortly after midnight April 26 two negroes stopped at his garage in Tracy for repairs to Chinchio's car. He identified the suspects here.

Narvik Siege Tightened by Allied Fleet, Troops

Damaged by a mine April 15 in the Kattegat.

The reported bomb hit on a British battleship followed upon British official denial of Germany's claim Saturday that naval bombers had sunk a 30,000-ton British battleship and a heavy cruiser off Narvik on Friday.

DNV, official German news agency, also reported that Nazi warplanes had raided British naval units and troop concentrations in the vicinity of Harstad, about 100 miles from Narvik.

Hitler Sends Crack Troops

Adolf Hitler, noted for his dramatic surprises, today dispatched Alpine troops on a difficult 200-mile trek through almost impassable mountains in an attempt to aid the besieged Nazis at Narvik, which has become known in Germany as Norway's "Alzara."

The Fuehrer's trusted mountain troops began their march from the neighborhood of the little Norwegian town of Mo, north of Narvik, and the terminal both of railway and normal automobile highways. Between Mo and Narvik there is only a narrow country road, sometimes only a mere path.

Hitler apparently has decided he must make doubly sure of remaining in possession of Narvik as the western outlet port for ore from the Swedish Kiruna mines.

At the same time authorized sources in Berlin kept warning that all talk about the Mediterranean might be a blind and that the alleged British plans really are focused elsewhere.

The German high command also announced that the pacification of southern and central Norway was virtually completed with the surrender of the "Alzara" Norwegian fortress of Hogn, 20 miles east of Trondheim.

The Germans said that a small British-French force, left behind when the allies abandoned Narvik, was pushing northward toward Narvik, but expressed doubt whether the troops, exposed to air attack, could negotiate the 300 miles of mountainous country ahead of them.

Chamberlain Assailed

In Britain, demands for a more vigorous prosecution of the war rose in advance of Prime Minister Chamberlain's scheduled appearance in the house of commons tomorrow to explain the allied withdrawal from central Norway.

There was a growing clamor for changes in the government and the tenor of press comment indicated the Chamberlain cabinet was facing its severest test. Well-informed sources, however, seemed to feel that Chamberlain would carry the day after a stiff fight.

Providing an obligation to the mounting thunder in southeastern Europe were events on the western front, where fighting surged for the third successive day around French outposts in the Saar section.

The French high command noted "marked activity" at artillery and advance units in this region following a series of determined but unsuccessful local thrusts by the Germans.

War Threat in Balkans Reported Getting Worse

both a week ago—and the heavy reinforcement of Italian troops on the Yugoslav frontier were reported in Yugoslavia. Yugoslav military quarters estimated Italy now has more than 300,000 men massed north of Fiume.

One Italian soldier was killed and three seriously wounded when a fascist troop patrol attempted to disarm a Yugoslav sergeant on Yugoslav territory near Fiume in one border incident, Yugoslavs asserted.

In the second reported incident, Yugoslav anti-aircraft batteries shot down an Italian observation plane at Bakar, near Fiume. Yugoslavs fished out the plane and charged its pilot, who drowned, had been photographing defense works.

Uneasiness was manifest throughout the southeastern capitals in a state of high tension for weeks past, and many diplomats, including United States officials, sent pessimistic reports to their governments.

There were strong indications that both Germany and Britain were jockeying for Bulgarian support in event of the outbreak of war in the southeast.

Britain was understood to have promised Bulgaria a large loan and a corridor to the Aegean, with the agreement of Greece, in order to insure a land passage for troops to Rumania.

ROME, May 6.—(AP)—An attempted German invasion of England in the near future is not only possible but highly probable, in the opinion of Giovanni Ansaldo, editor of Foreign Minister Count Ciano's newspaper Il Telegrafo.

In his weekly broadcast to Italy's armed forces, Ansaldo declared yesterday:

"Everything causes me to presume that this war very soon will see a great effort on the part of Germany to invade England in force."

"Never were conditions in which the present war is being conducted more favorable to the attackers, never were technical resources available to the enemy on the continent so favorable. The blow planned by Napoleon certainly will be attempted again."

figure which would increase the "spot" tank car price—upon which gasoline prices in that area are based.

The circuit court had reversed the convictions on the ground that the trial judge had given improper instructions to the jury.

It was held by the circuit court that the jury should have determined whether the acts of the defendants constituted an "unreasonable restraint of trade" in violation of the antitrust law.

The justice department maintained that "the district court was correct in charging the jury that, if the defendants combined together for the purpose of raising and

fixing gasoline prices in the manner charged in the indictment and if they had the power to raise these prices, their restraint was unlawful and unreasonable."

Under the 1890 Sherman anti-trust act, combinations or conspiracies in restraint of interstate trade were declared illegal.

Permanency Planned

Smaller contributions also will be solicited and these will be placed in a fund for a combination mess hall and kitchen. The structure will be 18 by 36 feet and will cost approximately \$100. These improvements will be permanent and will be available for use by the Boy Scouts, Campfire Girls and other organizations operating under a public program.

The Boy Scout camp is located on a 50-acre tract donated by congress to the scouts for summer use. For the past few years the use of the property has been confined largely to short-term camps, due to the fact that the mess hall was demolished in a heavy snow storm a

few years ago. Local scouts have been joining with Lane county youths in their annual encampment. It now is proposed to rebuild the Wolf creek facilities in order that the local scouts may have their own camp rather than being put to an additional expense incurred in traveling to the Lane county or other areas.
