

Turner-Austin Go Tops Local Card

State Middleweight Crown at
Stake in Headline Bout of
Program Set for May 15th.

The first boxing card to be held in Roseburg for many months has been scheduled for Wednesday, May 15, at the Roseburg Legion, promoter, announced today. The bouts will be sponsored by Unipac post at the American Legion and will feature Leo Turner of Portland, popular Portland middleweight, in the 10-round main event.

Turner, who fought one of his first professional fights in Roseburg after winning the coast amateur title, is very popular with local fans, and since his first appearance here has made a sensational rise. He now holds the Oregon middleweight championship as a result of victories over Buddy Peterson.

His opponent here will be Kenny Austin of Omaha, a comparative newcomer to Oregon, but an extremely fast and hard hitting boxer. He has fought Logger Jack Hubbard, Sig Hartund and Bob Littlefield since his arrival in Oregon and has been clamoring for a match with Turner. The state middleweight title will be at stake in the local battle.

Turner has been meeting favor in fight centers along the Pacific coast and last night was featured in a 10-round main event at San Francisco, where he secured a

Southpaw Glenn Elliott held the invaders to two hits. Only one Husky reached first before the ninth when Elliott walked three men, filling the bases. He quickly recovered his form to fan Pettola for the third out.

Yankees Finally Drop Into Cellar

The world champion New York Yankees are in last place in the American league today. The same club that won four consecutive American league and world championships is floundering like a fish out of water day in and day out, losing 11 out of its first 17 games, five in a row and nine to left-handed pitchers.

The Yanks were whipped unmercifully 10-4 yesterday by the Cleveland Indians, who started Southpaw Al Smith against them and backed him up with a 14-hit attack.

The fans are so stunned they don't know whether to believe their eyes. It may be just as well, because those Yanks have made hasty appraisals bounce before. Joe DiMaggio had a perfect day at bat yesterday and Joe Gordon hit a homer with two on in the eighth.

The Boston Red Sox kept on top of the pile yesterday, securing past the Detroit Tiger 5-4 by bunting five hits for four runs in the fourth.

The Philadelphia A's outslugged the St. Louis Browns 10-8, with Benny McCoy getting four hits, to take over fourth place and the Chicago White Sox clinched out of the cellar with a 6-3 decision over Washington.

Brooklyn's National league leaders were rained out at Chicago and the Cincinnati Reds were blocked out of a chance to move into a virtual tie when the Boston Bees pounded Derringer off the mound and won 10-1.

The New York Giants plastered 17 hits against the Pirates for a 10-4 victory that not only ran Pittsburgh's string of defeats to eight but broke the Terrymen's own losing streak at four.

Stu Martin hit two home runs to lead the St. Louis Cardinals to a 7-4 triumph over the Phillies.
