Hair Styles Give Mother a Break

NEWEST COIFFURE LINES FLATTER MATURE FACES

The newest fashions in coiffures are: more wide waves and fewer curls; upsweeping but not upswipt lines. They are as flattering to the mature woman as to her daughters and younger sisters.

COIFFURE CAN IMPROVE FACIAL CONTOURS

This, unlike the era of the long, shoulder-length bob, is a season when the older woman can choose one of the up-to-the-minute, widely discussed hair-do's and know that it is right for her as well as newly fashionable. Mother ought not to have much trouble deciding on a becoming, 1940, coiffure for Mother's day parties.

She should remember, of course, that wispy curls or anything fluffy near the face do not, as was once supposed, soften the natural lines of maturity around the eyes or make a heavy jaw line less conspicuous. Instead, they often emphasize them, whereas fairly straight line coiffures, by contrast, may soften the lines of the face.

HORIZONTAL LINES ARE BAD FOR WIDE FACES

Also, since horizontal lines widen the head, smart hairdressers avoid them when arranging coiffures for the broad-faced. Wide, vertical and diagonal waves are ever so much more satisfactory because they lengthen the head and give it an oval outline.

Bangs and rolls over the forehead exaggerate a wide, flat nose and flatten the profile. But when the hair is drawn smoothly backward from the forehead, the too-small nose seems longer and larger, the lines of the profile more clearly defined.

For the long face with large features, a small roll of hair at one side of the forehead often is used to reduce the size of the nose and the severity of the contour. Flatness across the top, however, is important. Topknots of curls emphasize face's already too-long lines.

For evening coiffures, created to be worn at Mother's day parties and later on through the summer, florists have combined their best efforts with those of the coiffure experts. Both recommend that mother wear fresh blossoms in her evening hair-do's throughout the summer months.

They suggest a tiny cluster of fresh carnations or spray orchids on a hand pinned low on the neck for the mother who wants to soften the appearance of her profile. Or a targa of salmon pink gladiolus blossoms for the mother who wants to make her face seem longer. And, they add, a small spray of pale sweetheart roses and forget-me-nots, pinned on either side of the head—above the ear or behind it, is youthful yet dignified.



Lovely for mother to wear to a Mother's day party is this simply curled coiffure, on which is shown a tiny evening corsage of sweetheart roses and forget-me-nots. The hair is brushed up and away from the face at sides; softly swirled across the back and finished with soft, thick curls; arranged in loose ringlets at the front above forehead. It's a good hair-do for day or evening.
