## Slash Burnings To Require Permits

Closed Season to be Effective May 15; Requirements of Oregon Law Set Forth.

The annual closed season on burning of slashings will become effective May 15 and continue until December 31, unless sooner opened by proclamation by the governor. Fred Southwick, supervising warden of the Douglas Forest Protective association, announced today.

During the closed period it will be necessary for anyone burning any slashings, grass, grain, stubble, brush piles, etc., on his land or the land of another to first secure a permit from the forester or fire warden.

Permits may be obtained from the office of the association in Roseburg or from Arthur Woolley, Dr. Frank Trip, Asaiah Chester Smith, Glendale, and Roy Matthews, Davey Creek, who have been authorized to issue permits until the regular force of fire wardens is employed in the field.

What Law Provides

On and after January 1 of any year, or during any part of the year, it is unlawful for any person to use any power driven machinery in sawmilling, logging, operation of logging railroad or other operation on or within an acreage of a mile of forest land without first obtaining a written permit from the state forester, Mr. Southwick states. The forest operation permit application may be obtained from the office of the Douglas association or from L. C. Cummings, field inspector for the state forester.

All fire equipment pertaining to forest operations, such as fire tools, spark arresters, steam pumps, water hose, refuse burner, weather instruments and fire extinguishers, must be in place of operation by May 15. Mr. Southwick states. Such equipment must be kept in good repair until the fire season has been terminated. Periodical inspection will be made of all forest operations during the fire season.

Mr. Southwick states that the association will greatly appreciate the cooperation of the public in complying with the regulations during the closed season.
