

### Douglas Aid Asked In Red Cross Plea

The Douglas county chapter of the American Red Cross has been asked by national headquarters to immediately organize to raise \$1,000 for a war relief fund. Mrs. Harry Hatfield, chapter chairman, announced today. Arrangements...

Mrs. Hatfield reports that she has been asked to raise the county's quota, but as funds are needed at once, she is asking for voluntary contributions and states that donations may be left with the Roseburg News-Review. The chairman, or with E. S. McClain at the Roseburg branch of the U. S. National bank. A message telegraphed to Mrs. Hatfield this morning from headquarters is as follows: "With the invasion of Holland, Belgium and Luxembourg the war has entered a phase which will inevitably and at once bring widespread and appalling suffering to millions of helpless men, women and children. In order to inaugurate widespread relief measures, the American Red Cross is at once launching a campaign for a minimum war relief fund of ten million dollars. Your chapter quota is \$1,000. Please at once mobilize the entire leadership of your chapter and community in order that your quota may be raised and exceeded without delay."

### Blitzkrieg in Lowlands Slowed; Big Battle Opens

night. This was the first time French and German armored cars came into contact in large numbers.

South of Liege, the Germans are striking hard through the Belgian Ardennes in a due west direction. The Belgians are withdrawing slowly, periodically halting to offer a fight supported by allied aviation.

The French advanced cavalry detachments, having retired to the French-Luxembourg frontier. Their main forces are now in combat from the Moselle to Longwy, which the French hold.

The line of battle is at some points in Luxembourg and some points on French territory.

**Dutch Rulers Flee**  
The heirs to the royal house of the Netherlands—Princess Juliana, her husband, Prince Bernhard, and their two children—arrived in London.

The royal couple's nine-month-old daughter, Irene, arrived in a gas-proof box.

New battle fronts were drawn in Belgium and The Netherlands as the German invaders hammered at second line defenses in several sectors after breaking through heavily fortified frontier zones.

Residents of Brussels began to flee southward into France as one Nazi column, following the path blazed by the Kaiser's troops in 1914, blasted its way to a point 45 miles east of the capital.

Britain poured 20,000 picked troops into The Netherlands' system of water defenses in an effort to stem the advance, and allied troops fought side by side with the Belgians.

**Dutch Control Rotterdam**  
The Germans continued to drop large numbers of parachute troops behind the lines in both the invaded countries, but it appeared that these were being mopped up almost as fast as they landed.

The Dutch claimed to be masters of the situation at Rotterdam, where the Germans landed large numbers of troops in the first few hours of the invasion last week and where heavy fighting has been raging through the streets.

The Dutch admitted German troops had pushed their advance across the Meuse (Mouze) and IJssel rivers at several points. But an early-morning communique from the high command said that Netherlands border troops were withdrawn "virtually without damage."

Dutch aircraft bombarded the Nazi columns.

**400,000 French Aiding**  
French troops coming to the relief of The Netherlands' 400,000 man army engaged the enemy in the eastern part of north Brabant, where the Meuse runs north just inside the German border.

British troops were reported occupying land and flood-water defense posts in central Holland.

In Britain, the dynamic new prime minister, Winston Churchill, hastened to complete his government by naming seven ministers to supplement his five-member "war cabinet." He was given a unanimous vote of confidence, 381 to 0.

He told the house of commons the allied armies were meeting Germans in the first phases of one of history's greatest battles.

**"5th Columns" Raided**  
Developments in the low countries spurred the new government to a drive to step up the production of arms and munitions and to launch a drive to stamp out possible "fifth column" activities in England.

Approximately 2,000 Germans and Austrians residing in 20 English east coast counties were rounded up by Scotland Yard and hustled off to concentration camps on orders of the home office.

Sharp restrictions were placed on the movements of all aliens, particularly in coastal areas, and they were forbidden to appear on the streets after 8 p. m.

Strenuous measures were put into effect throughout Holland to guard against any further uprisings by traitorous fifth-columnists. Citizens in The Hague, seat of the government, were ordered to keep their doors and windows closed, and assembling of three or more persons in the streets was forbidden.

Curfew already was in effect in The Hague and civilians were banned from the streets in certain parts of the country from 8 p. m. to 8 a. m.

### Myrtle Creek Resident Jailed on Morals Charge

Melvin Harold Crawford, 34, a resident of the Myrtle Creek district, was held in custody today in lieu of \$500 bail, following his arrest by state police on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. He waived preliminary examination upon appearance this morning in the justice court and was ordered held for the grand jury.

Also in custody was Chet Ray, 35, of Azalea, who, after waiving preliminary examination, was ordered held to the grand jury on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses through issuance of worthless checks. Bail fixed at \$250 was not furnished.

### Prisoner Admits Role in Attempted Bank Robbery

TACOMA, Wash., May 11.—(AP)—Russell Pierce, 24, was quoted by Undersheriff Knowles last night as having admitted participation in the attempted holdup of the Orling State bank Thursday.

Knowles made the announcement, declaring that Pierce had admitted being with Kenneth E. Ambler, confessed principal in the attempt, but had denied knowing that Ambler planned to rob the bank.

Ambler, arrested in the bank Thursday when a woman employee sounded an alarm and covered him with a pistol, was charged with attempted robbery.

Knowles quoted Pierce as saying: "When he (Ambler) got out of the car in front of the bank, he told me to wait and to 'start driving' when he returned."

An automobile containing one man was driven rapidly away from the bank when the alarm was sounded. Pierce was arrested here later.

### Safety Discussed at Freight Line Meeting

A discussion of safety measures featured a meeting of officers and employees of the Pierce Auto Freight company for the Roseburg district at the Umpqua hotel Saturday evening. Twenty-three persons were present for the safety meeting. Principal speakers were A. C. Pierce, Meford, president, and Walter Smith, Portland, safety director. Methods of safe driving and rules of the state commission were discussed. Local arrangements were made by W. J. (Bill) Adair, manager for the Roseburg district.

small amount of the grant lands has received nothing from income for several years, due to the fact that it still owes approximately \$80,000 for money advanced.

Under the new law, however, Douglas county will be allotted 75 per cent of the income, and will receive 50 per cent of the amount with 25 per cent to be applied on the old debt until it is retired. It is estimated that the county for the coming fiscal year will be credited with approximately \$6,000, of which it will receive \$3,000 with a like amount going to the debt retirement.
