The first division of the exhibit was a case containing an albino siskin squirrel which was captured by Myrl Barkhurst of Days Creek. Mr. Britton requested that this animal be taken to the state fair and Pacific International in the fall. In the corner was a cut from a Douglas fir tree which showed the age of the tree when a certain event occurred. The tree was 215 years old. A slip of paper also pointed out the various parts of the tree. Directly above the tree cut was a hollow showing how a tree grows. Another forest oddity was set on a yew wood stand. It was a stump over which the wood and bark had completely grown. Tacked on the wall overhead the stump was an illustration showing how this occurred.

The remainder of the exhibits were placed on a table. The first was a piece of plywood containing the lumber of the South Umpqua. Samples of four-inch squares of the following woods were placed on the board: Douglas fir, incense cedar, western red cedar, red alder, western yellow pine, western hemlock, Port. Oregon cedar, sugar pine, broadleaf maple, Pacific yew, chinquapin, and Oregon white oak. Besides this was a board containing samples of the fungi of the south Umpqua. Further up was an exhibit entitled lumber defects. These specimens were cut in the shapes of triangles, rectangles, and hexagons, and placed on a varnished rectangle of plywood. The specimens represented were a ground rot of Douglas fir, insect boring of sugar pine, split knot of Douglas fir, wind shake of sugar pine, pitch pocket of sugar pine, cork rot of Douglas fir, discoloration of sugar pine, insect work of western red cedar, pitch in wind shake of sugar pine, pencil rot of incense cedar, loose knot of Douglas fir and wind shake of hemlock. The next exhibit was one of wild flowers of Days Creek community which had been pressed and placed on a stained square of wool. Laying beneath this imbedded in moss were some sections of trees of our community which had been saved and quartered. On another section of the table were oddities made from woods. Some pieces exhibited were bookends made from maple bark, nut shell, nut, and ash tray. Another interesting article of this exhibit was a piece of sassafras bark. A sign made from madras twice saying "Forestry" designated these exhibits. C. C. Hill and Myrl Barkhurst are leaders of these clubs.

The next club to show their products was the Bachelor Bakers, led by Josephine Wright. These six boys have produced twenty-four bakings of cookies at a cost of \$4.44. They have prepared two hundred and thirty-five individual dishes which served one thousand and twenty at a total cost of \$30.20. All boys exhibited and were placed in following classes: Marshall Matthews, B. Robert Wright, B. Clifford Wootter, C. Richard Snyder, A. Bill Ward, B. and Art Ward, C. The girls' Cookery Club, also led by Josephine Wright, had a good showing. Five girls enrolled in Division I Cookery made two hundred and two individual dishes which served nine hundred and twenty-one at a cost of \$20.21. They baked twenty-two bakings of cookies at a cost of \$5.48. Five additional girls enrolled in Division III Cookery prepared and served thirty meals to one hundred and fifty-six persons at a cost of \$28.42. They baked one hundred and twenty loaves of bread at a cost of \$5.50. The girls were classed as follows: Henrietta Cham, B. Alice Mae Welch, A. Maxine Wright, A. Josephine Wright, B. Violet Goin, B.
