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MRS. WILLIAM CORWITH NATIONAL PRESIDENT AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY



Mrs. William Corwith, of Rockville Centre, New York, national president of American Legion auxiliary, will be in Portland May 15. It has been announced here by Mrs. Roy O. Young, district president of American Legion auxiliary. Mrs. Corwith will be entertained at the veterans' hospital for breakfast with a luncheon at the Heathman hotel to which all auxiliary members are invited. An open meeting at the Women's club in the evening will be the most important feature of the day. Any members from Roseburg who will be in Portland should plan to attend Mrs. Young stated.

Mrs. William Corwith, of Rockville Centre, New York, is leading the American Legion Auxiliary's 500,000 women this year as their national president. Under her administration the organization is making large membership gains in every part of the country and is achieving great progress in its program of civic and patriotic service.

Mrs. Corwith was unanimously elected to the presidency at the national convention in Chicago last September, following a dozen years of prominent service in local, state and national offices. A charter member of the Rockville Centre Unit, she demonstrated her ability for Auxiliary leadership in the activities of this unit. The state organization called for her services, first as a committee chairman, then as vice president and president of the department.

In 1936, Mrs. Corwith was appointed to take charge of the Auxiliary's radio broadcasting activities as chairman of the national radio committee. So successful was her work in this field that she was twice re-appointed and was completing her third year at the head of this important committee. She improved and expanded the Auxiliary's broadcasting from local stations and on national chains, personally directing many national broadcasts.

When the auxiliary went to New York City for its national convention in 1937, Mrs. Corwith was chairman of the national convention committee in charge of arrangements for the convention and the entertainment of the thousands of women who attended.
