Every state, county and city
official or board that handles
public money should publish at
regular intervals an accounting
of it, showing where and how
each dollar is spent. This is a
fundamental principle of demo-
cratic government.

THE discussion of the ballot, be-
ing conducted in this column
stopped yesterday with the "dele-
gate-at-large" division of the re-
publican list.

Next is the list of candidates for
delegate to the national convention
from the first congressional dis-
trict, our district. Guy Cordon of
Douglas county should, by all
means be elected. This is said,
not only because he comes from
our county but because he is an
experienced and an able man. As
was the case in the other delegate
list, no suggestion is made for the
remaining selection.

For president of the United
States, Senator Charles L. McNary
is the only candidate listed on the
Oregon ballot. Just because he
has no opposition is no reason to
omit the "X" before his name. The
senator should receive every re-
publican vote.

There is no candidate offered in
Oregon for vice-president on the
republican ticket. The next sec-
tion lists five candidates for presi-
dential electors—five to be chosen.
That should be an easy one.

Congressman James Mott is op-
posed for the nomination by Ken-
neth A. Brown of Marion county.
There is little question of Mott's
nomination—and he deserves it.

The next list of candidates,
those seeking the nomination for
the position of state treasurer pre-
sents what will probably be the
hottest contest on the state ballot.
Leslie M. Scott of Portland, Floyd
Cook of Portland and Earl Hill of
Lane county, a former legislator,
are listed.

As they go into the last lap it is
apparent that Cook is trailing and
that the race will be between Les-
lie Scott and Earl Hill. Hill is
unquestionably an able man, Scott,
however, has proven himself, in
service to the state as chairman of
the state highway commission for
several years, as a man of courage
and capacity. His father was
Harvey Scott, famed editor of the
Portland Oregonian. Scott if elected
will be a strong force as treas-
urer and hence as a member of
the state board of control.

The next three ballot sections
are for nominations for state at-
torney-general, state senator and
representatives in the legislature.
None of these positions are con-
tested.

The last section of the state bal-
lot lists the four Roseburg attor-
neys who seek the nomination for
district attorney for Douglas county.
This is a real contest with J.
V. Long the present D. A. seeking
re-election and the three others hot
after the job. They are, H. A.
Canaday, Tom Hartfield and Ray
Compton. No suggestions are of-
fered here—may the best man win.

Tomorrow the county republican
ballot and the non-partisan ballots
will be looked over and discussed
—then to clear for action and let
the voters take charge.

Soft Drink Trade Science Product

WASHINGTON, D. C.—One hun-
dred and seventy years ago, Dr.
John Priestly, one of the fathers of
modern chemistry, invented soda
water by impregnating water with
carbonic gas—carbon and oxygen.
Dr. Priestly thought highly of his
invention and named it "diphos-
phoric acid air," but he did not see
its full possibilities and did not go
into the soda water business.
The soft drink industry was
launched in 1897, when Townsend
Speakman, a Philadelphia druggist,
added flavor to soda water and
made it available to his customers
as a wholesome, refreshing and
thirst-quenching beverage.

In recent years, carbonated bev-
erages have become America's na-
tional drink. Just as in England,
the favorite drink is tea; in the
Scandinavian countries, coffee; in
France and Italy, wine; and in Ger-
many, beer; so in the United
States, the people in the mass
seem to prefer carbonated bev-
erages.

Last year, the American public
bought more than half a billion
dollars worth of soft drinks. Soft
drinks are now on sale in more
places throughout the country than
are Uncle Sam's postage stamps.

Today, there are more than 6,
000 bottlers in America, employing
many thousands of workers. To ac-
quaint the consumer more fully
with the beneficial qualities of bot-
tled carbonated beverages and
with the sanitary conditions under
which they are produced, the bot-
tlers are planning to celebrate Na-
tional Bottled Carbonated Beverage
Week, May 12 to 18, 1940.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—(AP)—
An American Legion official,
praising quick action on legislation
to deport alien communists and
sympathizers, described members
of that party today as a "fifth col-
umn bent on destroying the United
States from within."
H. L. Chailaux, director of the
Legion's national Americanism
commission, appearing before the
house immigration committee,
said:
"The communist party is nothing
less than a foreign conspiracy
masked as a political party. We
have seen how it operates in Eu-
rope. We must stop alien agita-
tors here before they make further
progress."

Myrtle Creek Market Occupies New Quarters

MYRTLE CREEK, May 15.—The
fine new building erected by J. M.
Ledgerwood and son, Oren, on
Main street, is almost completed.
The City Market owned and op-
erated by the Ledgerwoods, and the
McDonnell bakery are both housed
in this building which is 38 by 90
feet in dimension.

A large refrigerator showcase in
the market sales room at the front
takes care of a choice display of
meats, sea foods, etc. A small of-
fice is in the corner of the sales
room and at the back of this is
the refrigerated cooling room for
the meats. The next department at
the rear of this room is a large
locker compartment, 15x30 ft.,
where 185 modern "walk-in" cooler
lockers are installed.

Across the back of the building
is a workroom 30x20 which has the
stove, water heater, and many oth-
er pieces of equipment necessary
in a market. The lights in the front
of the building are of the fluo-
rescent type.

A full basement which is used as
a warehouse and is planned espe-
cially to be used as a plant for the
killing and dressing of turkeys,
which is one of the major indus-
tries of this part of the county,
will be a valuable asset.

The left side of the building is
occupied by the Myrtle Creek
bakery. In the front room, deco-
rated in gleaming white is a tempt-
ing display of good things which
Mr. and Mrs. McDonnell are con-
stantly turning out.

Next door back is the bakery, al-
so dressed in snowy white, and
electrically equipped.

Last Saturday was opening day.
Sandwiches and coffee were served
all day to visiting patrons and
friends.

The construction of this building
has been strictly a local project.
The building was under the super-
vision of A. P. Johnson of Riddle,
and the work, which has taken
about four months, was done by
local men. Approximately \$3000
was expended for labor and about
ten men were employed nearly all
the time.

same ownership as the Tacoma
plant.
