Los Angeles traded Oakland 6 to 4, thanks to Candini, Oakland moundman, who issued four walks before he was jerked in the second inning. With a four-run lead start which they picked up in the first two innings, the Angels stayed in front and added two more in the seventh.

Hull Convinced Allies Will Defeat Germany

WASHINGTON, May 14.—(AP)—Secretary of State Hull was reliably represented today as convinced that the allies eventually would defeat Germany.

This was on the basis of a speech last night before the American Society of International Law in which Hull urged his listeners "to hold fast to the conviction that law and morality will triumph over the forces of lawlessness and chaos which have again risen to challenge the very concept of order under law—just as they have, in the past, triumphed over similar challenges."

As for himself, he said, "I am certain of that triumph."

Secretary Hull said the United States had no choice but to remain, and he called for a united

public opinion behind the nation's effort to exert its moral influence in a warring world.

New Type Fighting Plane Built for American Navy

BUFFALO, N. Y., May 14.—(AP)—The Bell Aircraft corporation announced completion today of an experimental all-metal low-wing single seater fighting monoplane for the United States navy.

Similar in design to the new air corps albatross, the army navy plane is powered with an Allison 12-cylinder engine of more than 1,000 horsepower.

Designed for aircraft carrier operation, the ship's power plant is installed near the middle of the fuselage. The engine drives the three-blade propeller through an extension drive shaft and gear box located in the nose.

The pursuit weights approximately 6,500 pounds, has a wing span of 35 feet and a length of about 29 feet 9 inches.

Injuries in Fall Kill Klamath Falls Woman

KLAMATH FALLS, May 14.—(AP)—Mrs. Evelyn Lucas, 65, died this morning of injuries suffered when she apparently fell from the roof of the two-story building housing her store. Passersby found her unconscious on the sidewalk early Monday morning.

Police said she had evidently missed her footing while inspecting the roof which was in need of repairs. She was the widow of Franklin M. Lucas, pioneer furniture dealer here, and is survived by two children.

Utility Head, Associates Deny Charges of Fraud

NEW YORK, May 14.—(AP)—Howard C. Hopson, founder and long a dominant figure in the \$1,300,000,000 Associated Gas and Electric system, and three associates pleaded innocent in federal court today to a 19-count indictment charging them with conspiracy and defrauding investors of more than \$20,000,000.

Federal Judge Goddard fixed bail at \$5,000 each, and tentatively set Sept. 3 for trial.
