

# Turner Defeats Austin in 4th Round

## Bout Ends After Fifth Knockdown

### Nationalista, Bailey Draw in Hot Semi-Final; Fenton Scores First Round K. O.

Leo "The Lion" Turner, Oregon middleweight champion, successfully defended his title here last night by beating Kenny Austin, Omaha, in the fourth round of the scheduled 10-round main event, highlighting the first of a series of American Legion sponsored boxing cards for the spring and early summer season.

In the torrid six-round semi-final Young Nationalista, 125 pounds, Portland, and Ernie Bailey, 128 pounds, Aberdeen, fought to a draw decision. In a special event, Babe Fenton, 133, Sutherlin, knocked out Buddy Walmer, 122, Vancouver, in the first round. In the preliminaries Pat O'Day, 162, Reno, won a decision from Ben Littlefield, 159, Chehalis, in a slow match, and Box Car Kline, 169, beat Charlie Gier, 163, Portland.

The gameness and stinging ability of Austin, 159 pounds, made a good showing against Turner, who weighed in at 155 pounds, but the Omaha boy, who has a long string of knockouts to his credit, was dropped three times in the fourth round, after he had weather-

ed a terrific battering, which dropped him to the canvas twice in the third frame.

**Referee Halts Battle.**  
The two boys started the scheduled 10-rounder at an unusually fast pace, with Turner boxing cleverly inside Austin's looping haymakers. In the second round Austin shifted to hard, jarring punches to the body and had the title holder on even terms, but early in the third round Turner drove a hard right hook to Austin's jaw, which dropped the challenger to the floor for a count of five. Austin, still groggy, went into a shell, but was straightened up by a blow to the side, followed by a short right to the jaw and was down again, but only for a count of three. He managed to hold briefly, then unloosed a punishing body attack to force Turner on the defensive until the bell.

The colored champion wasted no time in the fourth round. As Austin came out gingerly protecting his aching jaw, Turner slapped a solid left to the body. Austin took the count of nine but was promptly dropped again for a like count with another body blow. He rose gamely but a hard right to the face sent him reeling again, and Kid McCoy, Enterprise, referee, stopped the battle, awarding Turner the decision on a technical knock-

outs, took a hard battering from Bailey, but remained the aggressor throughout the battle. Both boys were reluctant to heed the bell and the referee was forced to drive them to their corners. The draw decision met with popular acclaim.

**Fenton Quick Winner.**  
Buddy Walmer, although a hard puncher, lasted only one minute and 41 seconds of the first round in the bout with Babe Fenton. As Walmer shot out a hard left, Fenton ducked under the blow and lifted the Vancouver boy off his feet with a short right hook to the jaw. The evening preliminary, between Kline, who gave his address as "Jungletown," declaring he had only been out of the box cars for the past two weeks, and Charlie Gier, was a good fight between two willing but inexperienced youngsters. Kline, aggressor throughout was given an earned decision.

The second four-rounder was a very slow engagement between O'Day and Littlefield. Both banty boxers, until the last 30 seconds when the boys stood up for a toe-to-toe slugfest, after Littlefield had been dropped to one knee for the count of nine. The knockdown gave O'Day the edge needed for a verdict.

The Cincinnati Reds beat the Brooklyn Dodgers 5-2 on the five-hit hurling of Thompson and a merry no-hitter in the first inning. Larry French held the Boston Bees to two hits as the Chicago Cubs triumphed 2-0; Hubbell of the New York Giants kept eight hits well scattered in penning up the Pittsburgh Pirates 5-2, and Higbe, the Philadelphia speedballer, easily whipped the St. Louis Cardinals 6-3 on eleven hits.

The same at Brooklyn, which put the Bees back on top in the seventh run, for the league lead, started out like a whirlwind with Cincinnati sending 11 men to the plate and scoring all its five runs. Yet the McKeechue men got only four hits in the big blast.

French's southpaw slant's led Boston helpless, but Strincevich nearly matched him. For six innings each gave up only one strike. The Chicago run came in the eighth when an error put French on first, a triple by Hack brought him home, and a single by Herman scored Hack.

The only runs Hubbell permitted the Pirates were home runs by Handlos on the first pitch of the game and by Elliott in the fourth inning.

All games in the American league were postponed because of rain and cold weather.

## Junior Baseball Aspirants Called

### Season's Practice Will Begin Saturday; Game Scheduled With Myrtle Creek High.

All boys eligible for American Legion Junior baseball are urged by John Collins, manager, and Irving Riegel, assistant manager, to turn out at Finlay field at 1 p. m. Saturday, May 18, to get the season's practice schedule under way. Boys who turn out Saturday and who can qualify will be taken to Myrtle Creek on May 26 for a game with the Myrtle Creek high school team. Manager Collins announced.

All boys born after Jan. 1, 1923, are eligible to participate in the American Legion Junior baseball activity. Umpqua post of the American Legion at Roseburg each year has sponsored a junior team, and, in addition, has held baseball classes for boys of the intermediate and mid-level divisions. The practice of the county's B league schools in sponsoring baseball is expected to be of great help this year in developing another strong Douglas county team. Yonahla and Myrtle Creek are each expected to contribute players to the county team, while other teams may produce acceptable talent. All boys of the county, within the age limit, are eligible to participate in junior baseball, as the Legion post has authority to use boys from any point within the county for the local team.

**New Material Needed**  
Almost a completely new squad must be organized this year. Indications are for two good twirlers, Applegate and DeBernard, from last year's team, while other pitchers may be picked up from some of the B league teams. Rutter, Melvin Baker and Rice, from last year's squad, also are inside the age limit and eligible for play this year. Several good prospects are

available from last year's intermediate squad.  
Junior baseball in Roseburg suffered considerably last year from lack of suitable competition, but this will be remedied this season, it is believed, as Eugene, Medford and Marshfield are expected to have teams, which will furnish a number of good games prior to the district and state eliminations.

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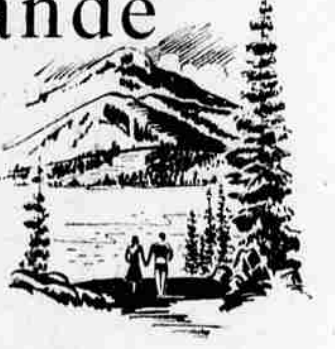
