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Every state, county and city official or board that handles public money should publish at regular intervals an accounting of it, showing where and how each dollar is spent. This is a fundamental principle of democratic government.

MORE than 20 years ago men fresh from the shell-torn battlefields of the world war, through their organization, The American Legion, urged upon the congress of the United States and upon administration leaders a program of "adequate preparedness." For two decades the American Legion and other organizations of veterans have persistently urged upon the United States an increase in its defense forces. A program for non-profit war has been stubbornly advanced year after year and has fallen upon deaf ears.

Pacific missionaries toured the country to speak against the defense program proposed by the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and like groups of American veterans. The ex-servicemen were abused and ridiculed for suggesting that the United States could best safeguard its peace by being prepared for war.

Yesterday the president of the United States spoke to a nation made jittery by the situation in Europe. A great populace prays for peace but frankly expresses belief in the imminence of war. A frantic congress today is reported preparing to carry out in a burst of speed an unprecedented defense program.

Millions of dollars doubtless will be used to produce speed in production of war supplies—millions that could have been saved had the congress heeded the words of experienced veterans and proceeded to build the nation's defenses in an orderly manner over a period of 20 years.

If any person ever had a right to utter than time-worn phrase "I told you so," it is the American veteran of the world war, who at least has the satisfaction of knowing that his program, so insistently held before a great nation, at last has been adopted, even though only as an alternative to disaster.

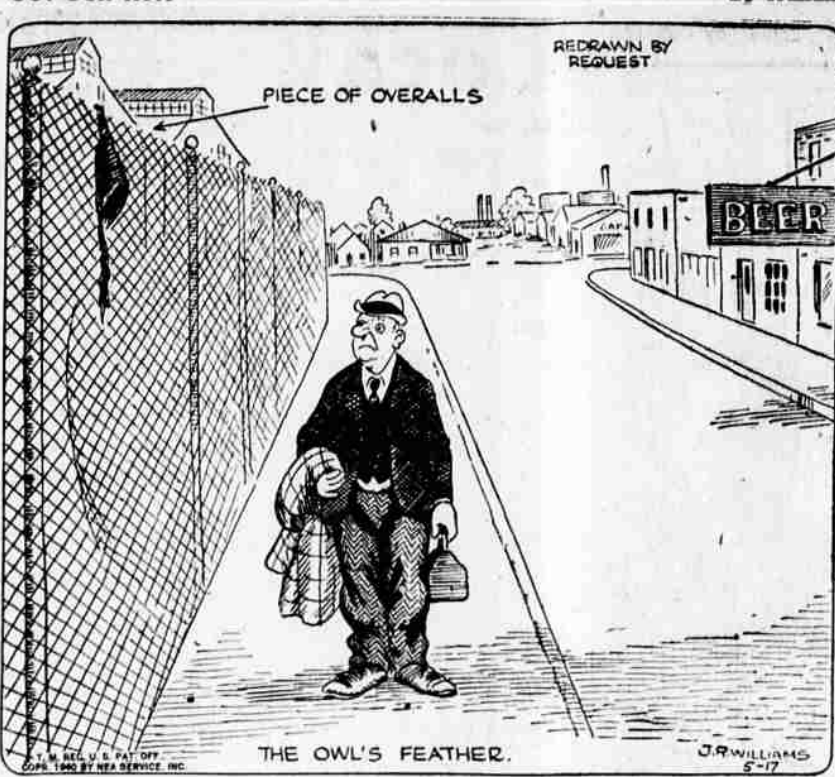

Negro Oddity In Spokane Passes

SPokane, May 16.—(AP)—Jim Young, widely known negro speaker, operator and police character whose "African highball" brought him fame, money and trouble in Spokane for 25 years, was dead today.
Early this morning police found him dead from a heart attack in his hotel room after friends had reported he was missing for more than a day.
Next to his African highball, Jim loved fine clothes best, and when he was found was wearing a rich, brilliantly hued silk dressing gown. Before, during and after prohibition, Jim styled himself as "king of the bartenders," and the best dressed of them all. He was reported once to have had 75 suits in his wardrobe.
Jim's age also was a mystery. Today it was reported as 77. When arrested in 1923, he was booked as 42, three years later he said he was 60 and one year after that 61.
The police were Jim's friends, though he was in their hands at least 12 times.
"Jim was always a gentleman," said Capt. Maurice Dugger, "I never knew of him raising his voice in anger against anyone. He never caused trouble."
Practically all Jim's arrests were for violation of liquor laws.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 16.—(AP)—A 20-year contract for a minimum of 2000 kilowatts of prime power was signed yesterday with the Tillamook County Public Utility district, the Bonneville administration announced.

Sedan Famous In History of Wars

By the Associated Press.
Ancient Sedan, 166 miles north-east of Paris, was the scene of the climactic flight of the Franco-Prussian war in 1870, in which the French troops of Napoleon III were crushed. It brought about the fall of the second empire.
And then, in the world war, the Germans advancing toward Paris entered Sedan Aug. 25, 1914, and held it four years. It fell into the hands of the allies Nov. 6, 1918, after a joint attack by the American, British and French divisions and the French.
Strategically, the capture of the city by Germans would not mean the breaking of a French line along the Meuse river because the town is on the right, or east, bank. The old city probably gave its name to the Sedan automobile.
Sedan chairs, easy riding conveyances which carried the gentry on peasant shoulders in the 18th century, first were made in Sedan, legend has it.
The town has a population of around 18,000. Major industries are cotton mills, coal and iron mines.

BALTIMORE, May 16.—(AP)—Horace E. Dodge, Jr., 47-year-old automobile millionaire, was honeymooning today with Martha (Mickey) Devine, 27, former Vanities show girl.
It was Dodge's third marriage. In 1921 he married Miss Lois Knowlton and they were divorced in 1927. She reportedly received a settlement of \$100,000. In 1928 he married Mariel Sloman in London. They were divorced in 1933.
