WAR SIDELIGHTS

EUGENE, May 17.—(AP)—A 17-year-old Eugene high student was off to Germany today, probably to fight in Hitler's Nazi legions.

Wolfgang Ebenwein, a German subject who has been attending school here on a visitor's permit, was left for his homeland, he knows not by what route, because German officials would not renew his passport again.

NEW YORK, May 17.—(AP)—Otto D. Toltschus, winner of the 1940 Pulitzer prize for foreign correspondence for his dispatches to the New York Times and formerly of the Times' Berlin bureau, has been banned from Germany.

Toltschus, now in Sweden, is writing a book based on his dispatches and articles from Germany to explain the economic and ideological background for the "fourth reich."

WASHINGTON, May 17.—(AP)—Americans in the British Isles, which are facing the threat of wholesale German aerial bombing, have been warned to go to Ireland.

The state department, announcing this today, added that government officials here "will consider the possibility of sending to the west coast of Ireland a vessel for use of those desiring to return to the United States." There are more than 7,000 Americans in Great Britain and northern Ireland, according to state department figures.

Relief Fund Can't Be Cut, House Told

WASHINGTON, May 16.—(AP)—Representative Cannon (R., Mo.) asserted to the house today that world and domestic conditions were so unsettled that congress must abandon original plans to slash relief appropriations and provide enough money to help the same number of unemployed that have been added this year.

Opening debate on a \$975,000,000 WPA bill before President Roosevelt arrived to deliver an extraordinary defense message, Cannon said: "Here is the situation. Under our present schedule of \$1,500,000,000 we are employing 2,000,000 men. If we curtail the program, we can employ only 1,500,000 men. In other words, we would have to drop 700,000 workers in America. "So radical a transition would be most disastrous."

Cannon pleaded with the members to agree to President Roosevelt's recent request that he be permitted to spend the \$975,000,000 in eight months if necessary in his budget message last year. Mr. Roosevelt recommended that amount for the full 12-month period starting July 1.

As debate began, one group of house members wanted to raise President Roosevelt's recommendations to \$1,500,000,000, approximately the amount voted for the year ending next July 1. Republicans, on the other hand, renewed their appeal for decentralizing the relief program. Representative Taber (R., N. Y.) drafted an amendment to use the \$975,000,000 for grants-in-aid to communities, with the federal government putting up 75 per cent of relief expenditures and the localities giving the remainder.
