American Legion Auxiliary Activities

Thank God I am an American! As this is written I am mindful of the fact that today we are privileged as Americans to cast our vote for those whom we choose to direct our government. No dictators, no monarchy here. I am mindful of the fact that my aunt has just passed her 100th birthday and in that time has seen many wars. And yet America is on top! Today is the birthday of both a brother and a daughter. The brother running for a Portland office which he promises to conduct efficiently, the daughter entering a year which may prove momentous for this country. As the industrious neophyte of the Legion, the auxiliary through the years has sought unceasingly to stimulate concern for government—the most important human enterprise.

"Every hour, every day, history is being made." We had that thought forced upon us this week. President Roosevelt has called for a new national defense program. Mrs. Guy Cordon, national defense chairman of Umpqua unit, states that this is a program similar to that advocated by the American Legion for twenty years. She quotes the Honorable Harry H. Woodring, secretary of war, in speaking before the patriotic committee on national defense: "I, as a secretary of war, want a real army, no gigantic military host, I want an army completely prepared to assume the onerous, the awful responsibilities which will be imposed upon it if that mailed fist of Mars, which now is held so ominously over this whole world, should ever crash upon the shore of this, my own country."

We can help give America the courage and inspiration to meet the new dangers brought forth this week through the memory of those who died in the nation's defense amid the poppies of France. This week the American Legion auxiliary president, Mrs. William Corwith was in Portland meeting with representatives from the state. But before she left for the west Mrs. Corwith had the great pleasure of presenting to the president of the United States a memorial poppy. Placing it in his buttonhole, President Roosevelt expressed his appreciation of the meaning of the little red flower. He discussed with Mrs. Corwith the conditions of the disabled veterans and their need for the occupation that poppy-making gives them. He voiced the hope that the observance of Poppy day this year would achieve its purpose of honoring the world war dead and aiding the disabled and dependents.

While in Washington, Mrs. Corwith also presented a poppy to Gen. Frank T. Hines, administrator of veteran affairs. From his deep knowledge of conditions among the disabled and their families, General Hines spoke warmly of the value of the aux-

Greyhound Bus System Operates Despite Strike

SAN FRANCISCO, May 17.—(AP)—Railroad union pickets marched monotonously in front of Pacific Greyhound terminals and stops today, as the bus lines continued to meet its regular schedules in seven states, despite a strike of bus drivers.

Those who walked out yesterday are members of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. Drivers still on duty belong to the AFL Drivers' union, called the "Amalgamated," in abbreviation of the Amalgamated Association of Street, Electric Railway and Motor Coach Employees of America.

Brotherhood union spokesmen claimed at least 450 drivers were on strike and schedules were noticeably below normal. Company officials insisted only about 175 were striking, and asserted operations were "99 per cent normal."
