

Fingerprinting Made Respectable

Comp Fire Girls' Response Wins Citizenship Honors From Their Organization.

NEW YORK—Gone are the days when it was a disgrace to be fingerprinted. Today it is the civic-minded thing to do.

When the country's Camp Fire Girls learned that Uncle Sam wanted everybody's fingerprints for the civilian file at the federal bureau of investigation, they rushed by the thousands to have their fingerprints recorded and thereby win citizenship honors from their organization.

To young, earnest Camp Fire Girls who had their fingerprints recorded in Washington, J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the F. B. I., explained: "Immediately upon its receipt in the F. B. I., a fingerprint card is classified by one of our fingerprint experts and then filed in the personal identification files. All cards are filed in accordance with a technical classification system and not by the name of the individual whose fingerprints appear on the card."

"If later, the same fingerprints are forwarded to the F. B. I. as those of an unknown deceased person, a victim of amnesia or accident, a fingerprint expert will be able to identify the person in approximately three minutes."

"Approximately two million civil fingerprint cards have been received by the federal bureau of investigation and placed in the personal identification files since the inauguration of this project in 1933."

"I look forward to the day when the vast majority of Americans will voluntarily place their fingerprints on file in the civil identification files of the F. B. I. Camp Fire Girls who are being fingerprinted have two objectives in mind—to put their fingerprints on record, as the government wants all citizens to do, and by so doing to help make fingerprinting the 'fashion.'"

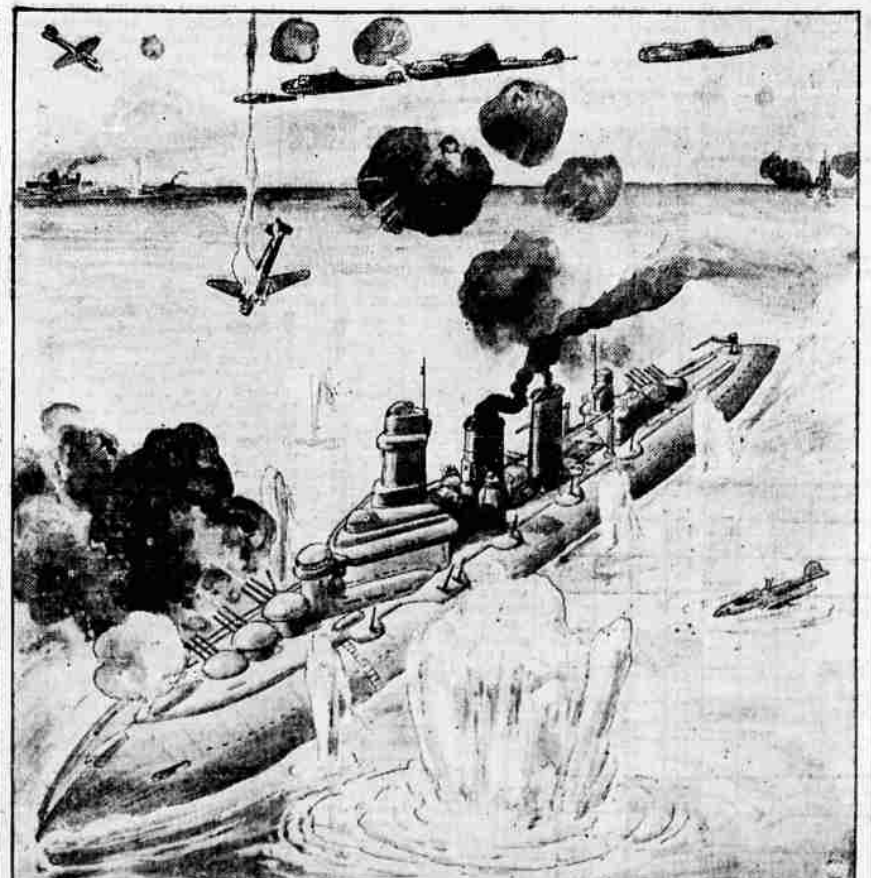
