Germans Seize Antwerp, Drive in France Slowed

said to be leading the offensive in what a French war ministry spokesman called "the most gigantic battle of all times."

The Germans were estimated to be using between 2,500 and 3,000 tanks in the French pocket and French artillery at some places was firing point blank at the lumbering monsters.

Great numbers of these, accompanied by masses of planes and followed by lighter units and infantry, were striking through the Verdun region toward the Oise river and through the Avesnes region toward the Sambre river.

Verdun is 95 miles inland northeast of Paris. Avesnes is 20 miles north of Verdun and 110 miles inland northeast of Paris.

French Learning How

The French reported the German progress was only "slight" in the Avesnes sector. The principal effort seemed to be around Verdun, where French artillery not only was pouring shells against the German tanks but French said they had brought up enough of their own tanks to hold the ground.

The French command said that after the experience of the last few days the French had learned how to deal with the German tank onslaughts.

The Germans also attacked near Sedan, at the southeastern extremity of the pocket more than 60 miles inland southeast of Avesnes, and further east at Montmedy, a fortified position guarding the western end of the main Machine line, but these attacks were beaten off, the French said.

Belgians Holding Out

Retreat in Belgium was admitted by the allies but was explained as a withdrawal to conform with the situation in France.

Capture of 2,000 Dutch and French soldiers in Holland was reported by the Nazi high command.

The Dutch commander on Walcheren Island, in the southwestern Zeeland province, had offered to capitulate, it said, and several Dutch naval vessels were taken.

Fighting in the air was unabated. The Belgian forces at Namur are still holding out. However, French news agency reported today in a dispatch from "somewhere in Belgium."

King Leopold was reported to have sent the city's defenders a message calling on them to "resist to the end for the fatherland."

appeared likely to clinch his position as democratic national committee man. He tallied 35,511 votes in 969 of 1693 precincts to 21,987 for Flavel Temple, Portland.

Ralph H. Cake, Portland, head of a commanding lead in the republican race, tallied 27,581 votes from 979 precincts, followed by Thurlow Weed, Beaverton, 24,541; Arthur M. Geary, Portland 16,211, and Milton R. Klepper, Portland, 9,519.

Leslie Scott Wins
In the republican state treasurer's race, Leslie M. Scott, Portland newspaperman, polled 42,263 in 964 of 1693 precincts and appeared too far in the lead to be overtaken. Earl Hill, Clatskanie, drew 20,753 votes and Floyd J. Cook, Portland 14,162.

The democratic contest shaped up like a run-away for A. L. Brown, Portland, after an earlier tight fight. He won 29,199 votes in 963 of 1693 precincts to 16,196 for Lyman Ross, Aloha.

5 PUD Issues Lose

Portland's proposed people's utility district to distribute Bonneville power was snuffed under 23,679 to 9,769 in reports from 163 of 392 precincts. The city is served by two private companies.

In four other counties—Lincoln, Crook, Tillamook and Yamhill—complete counts showed PUD's better ground. Washington county showed a slight trend in favor of a PUD, but no trend has been established in Columbia county, the other proposed district.

Portland's mayoral race gave H. Earl Ryle a lead of 14,668 to 8,418 for Frank Hilton, church-sponsored candidate in the non-partisan contest. Other candidates were too far behind to figure, although the votes they drew assured Hilton of a place on the general election ballot.

Sympathy Major Need of Alcoholic

BOSTON.—(AP)—Sympathy for the alcoholic, instead of family censure, was urged by a Boston psychiatrist at Boston city hospital.

Declaring the man who drinks too much is "not a normal man," but one who is "emotionally sick and needs help and treatment like any other sick person," Dr. Merrill Moore said in a radio address (WAAE) sponsored by the Massachusetts medical society.

"The first step is for the patients family to try to realize that the alcoholic... needs help and sympathy rather than scolding and nagging."

He said families could aid also by seeing that the alcoholic eats enough—plenty of vitamins—and by encouraging him to pursue "other recreations" like hobbies besides drinking, but he added that the chief means of treatment lies with the doctor through psychotherapy.

The latter approach, he said, involves finding out the underlying cause for the patient's drinking—fatigue, fear, boredom, unhappiness—and trying to do something about it.

"The drinking itself," he said, "is not the sickness but it is the symptom of a sickness. It is a warning of a disturbance, just as a fever is a warning of disease somewhere in the body."

888 in actual cash and contract authorizations to make the rest of its total.

Additions to the regular navy supply bill are scheduled to be made by a subcommittee next week in line with the president's request. They will bring the total prospective outlay for the navy to \$1,303,907,288, of which \$1,217,797,478 will be in cash appropriations and the remainder in contract authority.

Thus the nation's total defense bill, including cash outlays and contract authority, for the new fiscal year would reach \$3,131,472,452.

To Eliminate Delays
Vinson made his proposal after hearing testimony by navy department experts as to "bottlenecks and delays."

He said that whenever the president declared a "national emergency" to exist, the chief executive and the secretary of the navy should be able to do these things now prohibited by law:

1.—Make advances on naval contracts up to 30 per cent before start of work or up to 100 per cent before completion to finance contractors.

2.—Remove present requirements for competitive bidding on naval contracts including aircraft.

3.—Suspend present wage and hour standards of the Walsh-Healey act when these were found to be "prejudicial" to national defense.

4.—Suspend federal profit limitations of 10 and 12 per cent on contracts of \$25,000 or less. The present limit is \$10,000.

5.—Permit the navy department to make allowances for plant expansion costs on navy contracts. These costs now are subject also to treasury department approval.

6.—Remove present work period limits of 40 hours weekly and 8 hours a day, with a provision for overtime payment at a rate of "time and one-half." This would apply to government naval workers or those on government contracts and would set up a maxi-

mum of 48 hours subject to increase by presidential order.

coroner, had made his home for many years, the latter pulled out in front for a comparatively safe lead.

Stellar Quine campaign for nomination and re-election as school superintendent on the non-partisan ballot, was forced into a run-off election in November with Lulu C. Correll of Umpqua. While holding a considerable margin of votes over her two competitors for the nomination, Mrs. Quine lacked a majority of the votes cast and, therefore, the two highest candidates will contest the general election vote.

Republican voters in Douglas county polled substantial majority for Ralph H. Cake, as national committeeman and chose Florence A. Runyan by a very narrow margin for national committeewoman. Both candidates are from Portland.

For the four delegates at large to the republican national convention, Douglas county voters proposed Robert N. Stanfield, Phil Metcalch, Walter L. Toole and Robert Elliott, all of Multnomah county. Significant in the declarations of the four candidates approved by Douglas county voters proposed Senator McNary of Oregon as the logical republican presidential nominee.

Cordon Gets Big Vote.
Guy Cordon, Roseburg attorney, was given a very flattering vote in the balloting for delegates to the republican convention from the first district, having more than a 2-to-1 lead over Walter Nordlund of Clatsop county, the second choice of the voters apparently as a result of a great deal of "single-shot" voting, in which republicans cast ballots only for Cordon.

Senator Charles L. McNary, prominently mentioned as a possible standard bearer for the republican party in the forthcoming presidential election, was given a very fine vote by Douglas county republicans, as was Congressman James Nott, who defeated his opponent in Douglas county by approximately 8 to 1.

Earl Hill, prominent Lane county resident, was the choice of the county's republicans for state treasurer. I. H. Van Winkle for attorney general; C. W. Clark for state senator, and C. C. Hill and Robert Gile for state representatives and O. L. Johnson for county treasurer, received substantial votes.

Democratic voters approved Howard Latonette and Emily F. Edson, both of Multnomah county for national committeeman and national committeewoman, respectively.

For the four delegates at large to the national convention, the county democrats approved William Mahoney, Charles F. Hyde, J. W. Morrow and Lotus L. Lander, all avowedly supporters of President Roosevelt.

For delegates from the first district to the democratic convention, the voters proposed A. E. Reames of Jackson county and S. Stephenson Smith of Lane county, both of whom declared for the president, while the next high candidate, J. E. Clifton of Marion county was one of the trio of candidates supporting the third term.

Demos Favor Third Term.
That the democratic voters favor a third term for President Roosevelt rather than the candidacy of Vice-President Garner was shown by a 4-to-1 vote for the president.

Charles A. Robertson of Polk county was the democratic choice to contest the November election with James W. Mott for representative in congress.

For state treasurer the democrats of Douglas county proposed Lyman Ross of Washington county to oppose the republican nominee.

Bruce Scudling of Polk county, unopposed for attorney general, received a large vote, as did W. L. Hedger of Clatsop county, who by virtue of his nomination will oppose the republican candidates Hill and Gile for the office of state representative.

Hoefft for sheriff, Roy Agee for county clerk, and D. H. Lenox for treasurer, the latter two incumbents in office, were unopposed.

Treasurer Lenox will be opposed in the general election by the republican nominee, Oliver L. Johnson. County Clerk Agee also is expected to have opposition in the person of former Clerk Ira B. Riddle, whose name reportedly was written in by a large number of republican voters.

R. H. S. Athletes Fail to Get First at State Meet
Jim Finlay, Roseburg high school's ace hurdler, qualified for the finals in the 110-yard high hurdle race when he placed second to Taylor of Seaside in the first heat of the qualifying trials of the annual state track and field meet held Friday afternoon at Corvallis.

The heat was won in the exceptional fast time of 15 flat. Finlay was eliminated in the low hurdles when he failed to place in his heat.

The Indians' other entrants, "Red" Carson in the shot and the relay team, also failed to place in the qualifying trials thus eliminating them from further competition. The finals were held this afternoon under almost perfect weather conditions.

Roseburg High Tennis Players Defeat Salem
Roseburg high school tennis team defeated Salem high school 6 to 1 on the local courts Friday. Despite the fact that Carstens, Roseburg's No. 1 man, and Sullivan No. 3, were suffering from injuries, both players took their matches. Carstens was playing in spite of a sore shoulder and Sullivan has an injured knee and ankle.

ary objectives and described as completely unorthodox. German allegations that the British fliers had bombed civilians.

All government offices, headquarters of the British Broadcasting corporation and key positions throughout Great Britain were placed under armed guard today against possible sabotage by fifth columnists or Nazi parachute troops.

Flirting With Russia.
Winston Churchill's new win-the-war government was said by reliable sources today to be seeking a "new and more friendly approach" to improvement of relations with soviet Russia.

Inclusion of the labor and liberal parties in the new cabinet was said to have paved the way for abandonment of the so-called "stiff-necked" attitude toward the U. S. S. R., credited to former Prime Minister Chamberlain and most of his conservative regime.

A softening of press attacks already has been noted. Russian Ambassador Malinsky, Lord Halifax, foreign secretary, on Thursday, and it is understood they discussed problems raised by British contraband control—principally delays in shipping and how to shorten them.

It was hinted that this discussion might open the way for trade negotiations on a broader basis, and ultimately lead to an improvement in political relations between the two countries.

A few days before Churchill took over as prime minister May 10, Russian circles here said that Britain's entire attitude toward the soviet was regarded as "unsatisfactory."
