

Major Leagues See 20 Home Runs

Higgins of Detroit Hits Three in Succession; Yankees Lose to Cleveland, 10 to 2.

By JUDSON BAILEY (Associated Press Sports Writer) Home run hitting being what it is today, a fellow just about has to collect them in clusters to get any notice.

There were 20 round trip tickets punched in the major leagues yesterday and the same number the day before.

But you can't overlook three in one game, which is the little stunt Pinky Higgins of the Detroit Tigers showed the Boston Red Sox in beating the American league leaders, 10-2.

The trio of homers came on consecutive times at bat and brought in four other runners for a total of seven tallies as the veteran third baseman personally matched the scoring efforts of the entire Boston team.

The victory was credited to Schoolboy Rowe, who went out to the mound in the fifth after Jimmy Foss had hit his tenth home run of the season with the bases loaded off Tommy Bridges. Another "exception that proves the rule" is the fellow who hits only one home run a year. Lefty Grove got his for 1940 in this game, but later was knocked out.

Indians Maul Yankees. Jeff Heath of the Cleveland Indians, who hit two home runs in one game last Friday, hit two again yesterday as the Tribe trimmed the New York Yankees for the second straight time, 10-2.

Another home run bombardment originated from an unsuspected quarter, the Philadelphia Athletics, as they stopped the St. Louis Browns 4-1. Frank Hayes got two of the game's five homers.

The only game without a home run was the Chicago White Sox's 5-4 triumph over the Washington Senators, their first victory in Chicago this season.

The Cincinnati Reds were crushed 13-4 by the Boston Bees, six of the runs coming on homers by Al Lopez and Carvel Rowell.

The Brooklyn Dodgers lost another chance to take advantage of Cincinnati's plight by dropping a 6-4 decision to the Chicago Cubs.

The Pittsburgh Pirates lost another heart-breaker 8-7 to the Philadelphia Phillies and Cliff Melton, the New York Giants' seasoned southpaw, shut out the St. Louis Cardinals 6-0.

Question of Open Season on Cow Elk Undecided

Applications for special permits to shoot cow elk during the coming fall hunting season cannot be accepted at the present time due to the fact that the question of another open season on cow elk will not be determined until the July meeting of the Oregon state game commission.

During the past few weeks the Portland office of the commission has been flooded with applications accompanied with money orders and checks and all such applications are being returned to the senders by Frank B. Wire, state game supervisor.

"Until the commission reaches a decision as to whether there is to be another cow elk season, we cannot accept applications," said Supervisor Wire. "After that decision has been made and in the event that another season is decided upon, we must then determine the method of distribution of the permits so all applicants will not be given a false lead. Then we will make an announcement and will be ready to receive applications."

Youth, 16, Facing Death Chair for Slaying Girl

NORRISTOWN, Pa., May 20.—(AP)—Robert Helmenan, 16, pleaded guilty today to a general charge of homicide in the fatal shooting last month of Edith Snyder, also 16, a classmate at Abington high school.

The Snyder girl was slain the night of April 25 by a bullet fired through a window of her home as she studied at a living room desk.

The boy entered his guilty plea after the grand jury returned an indictment charging him generally with homicide.

Helmenan's father, Gustav, a gymnastics instructor at Temple university, Philadelphia, heard his son formally take the blame for the slaying.

The maximum penalty would be death in Pennsylvania's electric chair.

Second Milk Strike in 3 Weeks Hits Chicago

BUFFALO, N. Y., May 21.—(AP)—Fifty thousand dollars in cash may be a lot of greenbacks for a rookie pitcher, but take it from Steve O'Neill, manager of the Buffalo Bisons, "this kid Freddie Hutchinson is worth every cent of it."

The 21-year-old right hander, farmed out to the Bisons after a dismal showing with the American league Detroit Tigers, made his debut in the international loop Sunday against Montreal, allowing five hits in as many innings before the game was called because of rain.

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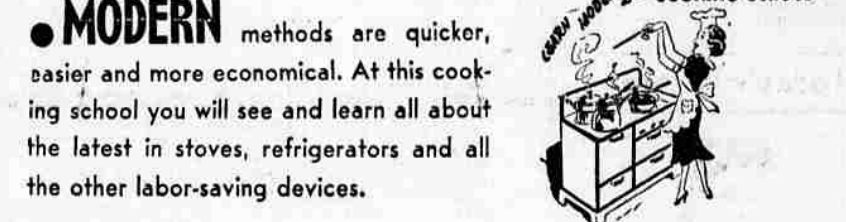
