Annual Naturalization day was observed in circuit court today, with 16 persons being admitted to citizenship, after taking the oath of allegiance to the United States and renouncing citizenship in the governments of which they formerly were citizens. The members of the class were welcomed and congratulated by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly, who presided over the examinations and admissions, and F. L. Crittenden, representing Umpqua post of the American Legion. Each of the new citizens was presented with an American flag as a gift from the Legion post.

**Louvain Library Burned**

Louis P. Lochner, Associated Press correspondent with the German western army, reported that the great Louvain university library, built with the help of funds contributed by American school children, was in ruins, its 700,000 volumes a total loss. It had replaced the library destroyed in the world war.

So swift was the course of fighting in France yesterday that Adolf Hitler was reported to have shifted his secret headquarters "somewhere in the west" three times to keep pace with developments.

**Allies Copy Foe's Tactics**

Counter attacks launched on the German flanks in several places indicated the allies were adopting the blitzkrieg methods employed by the invaders, making lavish use of tanks and planes.

British airmen continued their forays into Germany in an effort to destroy oil and gasoline supplies vital to the highly mechanized Nazi army.

In Ottawa, Prime Minister King, announced plans to hasten departure of a second Canadian division overseas and said a third would be recruited speedily.

Italy intensified her warlike preparations, ordering a three-day air raid drill and blackout in Rome province. Students again staged anti-fascist demonstrations but were dispersed by soldiers.

### FRENCH ADMIT GERMAN TACTICS UPSET CONCEPTS

PARIS, May 21.—(AP)—Premier Reynaud announced in the senate today that the classical French concept of war had come up against something new in deep motorized raids and parachutists.

"Telling the senators 'the truth' because it alone 'can save the fatherland,' the premier declared 'we must take immediate decisions.'"

He admitted that France had suffered from a lack of machine guns.

The premier laid part of the blame (three words censured) for the Nazi advance on the failure of French defenders to blow up bridges across the Meuse.

"These faults 'shall be punished,' he shouted and the senate, which had been listening in somber silence, broke into cheers.

German aerial losses now far surpass the three-to-one ratio previously announced, a war ministry spokesman asserted.

(Germans maintain they have the edge on a four-to-one basis.)

### Giraud Captured Before

The German assertion that they have captured a "Monsieur Giraud" of the French army recalls that General Henri Honoré Giraud was a German prisoner for three years in the world war.

Giraud, then a captain, was wounded and captured in the battle of Guise in 1914. He was interned in Germany, but escaped to France in time to take part in the attack on Malmaison in 1917.

### BRITISH SUFFER FRESH LOSSES IN SEA FORCES

LONDON, May 21.—(AP)—New German pressure on British sea forces came today as Britain suffered these naval reverses:

1. The 9,550-ton cruiser Effingham was lost "as a result of damage sustained through striking an uncharted rock off the Norwegian coast." It was the first cruiser Britain has reported officially lost since the start of the war.
2. Four British merchant vessels totalling 8,995 tons and one allied vessel of 316 tons admittedly were sunk "by enemy action" during the week ended May 10.
3. The sinking of the British minelayer Princess Victoria by a German mine with two officers and 31 men missing and feared lost was announced.

In Berlin, the high command reported damaging hits on a British battleship and heavy cruiser off the Norwegian coast as well as a destructive air raid on merchant shipping and French war vessels on the French-Belgian coast.

**More Equipment Needed**

Public clamor echoed Prime Minister Churchill's demand Sunday that "we must have quickly more tanks, more airplanes, more shells and more guns" as reports indicate a lack of material had caused repeated withdrawals in the vast "defensive battle" in France.

Churchill announced that a bill carrying the death penalty for treason would be hurried through its second and third readings tomorrow to hasten its enactment as a move against any "fifth column" activity.

**Balloon Servers Called**

The air ministry called today for more men of 24 to 45 "for duties with the balloon barrage," the system of balloons attached to steel cables by which a defensive cordon has been placed around London and other cities and about British air bases.

The so-called "balloon barrage" floating in the air like mine fields in the ocean, is intended to snare enemy bombers under conditions of poor visibility. Both Germany and England employ them.

The balloons, strung several thousand feet in the air on cables, with inter-lacing wires to form a network, keeping raiding bombers high and affect their accuracy. The barrage is useless in clear air.

SALEM, May 21.—(AP)—The perjury conviction of Hugh Reynolds, former secretary of Eugene A. F. L. teamsters who was sentenced to three years in prison, became final today when the state supreme court refused to reconsider its March 26 decision upholding his conviction.

Reynolds was convicted of giving false testimony in his trial on a charge of breaking windows in a non-union Eugene barber shop. He was sentenced to a year in jail, but the supreme court reversed that case.

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### Crusher Loan Sought

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A committee composed of Councilman C. W. Wharton, Ira B. Riddle and Percy Croft was appointed to meet with the county court in an effort to secure use of the county's rock crusher at Wilbur to provide surfacing material on a proposed WPA airport improvement project. The council was informed by Mr. Dawson, local WPA supervisor, that a project for surfacing the airport runway with approximately 10,000 yards of material now is being prepared. The WPA will provide all labor and equipment needed in hauling and placing the material but lacks funds to buy the gravel from the county, he states. The council declared that the county court should give some measure of cooperation as the airport is maintained for the benefit of the entire county and not for just the city of Roseburg. The committee will ask that the county court permit use of its crusher by a WPA crew without charge.

### Fire Protection Granted

An application by Morgan Lawson, residing 45 feet outside the city limits on East Douglas street, to be permitted to enter into a contract for protection by the city fire department was granted. Councilman Harris, chairman of the fire commission, stated it was against the commission's policy to make such contracts with individual property owners, but in view of the location of the property and the fact that a hydrant is located nearby, makes it possible to grant the request without cost to the city. Any residential areas adjoining the city limits, Mr. Harris said, may secure protection by forming a fire district, installing hydrants and other needed equipment, and contracting with the city for the services of the fire department.
