

## Jimmy Foxx Still Terrific Hitter

**Veteran's Bat Major Factor in  
Keeping Boston Red Sox  
at American League Top.**

Maybe it's nostalgia creeping up, but a fellow can't escape feeling every once in a while that the old heroes are the best heroes.

There's Jimmy Foxx of the Boston Red Sox. In the 15 years he has been swashbuckling around the American league, a lot of fine new faces have appeared and a lot of them have passed right on out.

But old "Double X" still is setting the opposing pitchers crazy with his terrific slugging. He hit a home run with the bases loaded yesterday for the second straight day to help Boston beat the Detroit Tigers 11-8 and get a stronger grip on first place in the junior circuit.

He has hit 11 homers and batted in 28 runs already this spring to set a spectacular pace for the American league. For a while he even was on top in percentage batting, runs scored and other department including stolen bases.

Foxx's blow yesterday came in the third inning when Boston was two runs behind. It was what the Sox needed to get them sparking and they punched out three other

homers to Detroit's two to win. Yankees Defeat Cleveland  
In the meantime the world champion New York Yankees took some of the pressure off Boston by beating the Cleveland Indians 10-2 with a 12-hit attack, led by Selkirk and Koller. Manager Joe McCarthy reinstated his world series lineup in spite of the fact the Tribe started a left-handed pitcher, and the league's leading pitcher, and the move proved profitable. The performance was all the more impressive because of three-hit pitching of Rhoads.

The Chicago White Sox edged out the Washington Senators 3-2. Kahel led the Sox's 15-hit assault with a perfect day at the plate, five hits including a home run and two doubles, but the deciding run was forced across with a walk.

These were the only completed games in the American league. The Philadelphia Athletics started to work out on the St. Louis Browns, with Frank Hayes hitting a home run with the bases loaded, but rain washed out the game in the middle of the fifth.

In the only contest the weather allowed in the National league the Brooklyn Dodgers squeezed past the Chicago Cubs 4-3 to end a three-game losing streak.

**New R. H. S. Coach  
Begins Workouts**

Jim Davis, Roseburg high school's new football coach, made an unexpected appearance late yesterday afternoon and wasted no time in calling for prospective grid players for their first workout. About 15 young hopefuls, most of them from junior high school, answered the first summons, but tonight's practice session is expected to more than double the initial turnout.

Due to the fact that Coach Jim Davis has just completed five weeks of spring drill, Coach Davis indicated that he would spend the time remaining until the end of school in short, snappy workouts, devoted principally to developing the proper stance, the initial charge, punting and passing and other fundamentals. The squad will eliminate their heavy protective uniforms and will run through exercise and work periods clad only in gym suits and football shoes.

Coach Davis was particularly pleased with the excellent turnout of junior high school and sophomore material. Though most of the players are undersized and very light, several already have shown enough promise to warrant giving them special attention in preparation for the vigorous fall campaign. It is the hope of the new mentor to arrange for several B league or six-man football games with Douglas county B league schools in order to give freshmen and sophomore material a chance to develop under actual game conditions.

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## "Mountie" Slain in Rush on Barricade

PARKLAND, Alta., May 22.—(AP)—Constable P. C. Council, of the royal Canadian mounted police, was shot and killed early today when he entered the barricaded home of Charles Hansen, wanted for the wounding of his son, George.

Council was shot as he and a party of police officers burst into Hansen's home after they had thrown tear gas into the house in an effort to dislodge the farmer, Hansen, barricaded in the attic, poked a rifle through an opening and shot Council in the head as the men started to search the lower floor of the house, officers said.

The other policemen retired to reform their lines and attempt a new attack.  
The farmer, prominent resident of this district 60 miles south of Calgary, barricaded himself in his home early this morning. His son, George, is near death in a hospital with a bullet wound.

Hansen's other two sons, Benny, 24, and Carl, 30, told police that late last night their father ordered them at gunpoint to drive him to George's farm. On reaching the farm the father, they said, stepped from the automobile and shot George in the stomach.  
Police said Mrs. Hansen and her daughter, Mary, are staying with friends after fleeing from the house when the father returned from George's farm.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 22.—(AP)—Col. Edward D. Baker, civil war veteran for whom Baker, Ore., was named, rested today in the Presidio national cemetery here.

Col. Baker was killed in action at the battle of Ball's Bluff, Va., Oct. 21, 1861. Prior to the war he had been a U. S. senator.

His son, Major Edward D. Baker, Jr., died at Vancouver barracks, Wash., in 1883.
