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Post Head Urges Poppy Day Support

Call for every veteran of the world war and for all other patriotic citizens to wear a memorial poppy on Poppy Day, Saturday, May 25, was issued today by Vincent Malone, commander of the Umpqua post of the American Legion. The commander's message stated:

"Twenty-two years ago the American forces in France were beginning a series of great battles which brought victory and peace to the United States and to the world. In those battles 50,000 young Americans gave their lives, and many thousands more were wounded and disabled. Those sacrifices assured our country the peace, freedom and democracy we have enjoyed since 1918.

"Bright red poppies studied the fields where those men fell and were the only floral tribute to their bare battle graves. In tribute to them we wear the poppy, their memorial flower, on Poppy Day each year. This year when world events have brought home to us anew the value of our American heritage, the poppy will have increased meaning to America. Wearing that little flower will show that we still are devoted to the ideals for which our war dead gave their lives so gallantly twenty-two years ago.

"I am calling upon every member of the American Legion to wear a poppy on Poppy day, Saturday, May 25, and I urge all other citizens to show their patriotic remembrance for the dead in a like manner. While remembering the dead, do not forget those who are still in the service of the nation's health and strength in the nation's service and the families left in need by war death or disability. Contribute for your flower as liberally as your means will allow and help make the poppy a symbol of hope for the living as well as of honor for the dead."

Noted Author to Speak At Baptist Church Here

Dr. Harry Rimmer, noted scientist and author, will be a speaker at the Baptist church at 8 o'clock tonight. Dr. Rimmer recently was given nationwide prominence as a defendant in a suit brought before the fourth district municipal court of New York City on his offer of \$1,000 to any person discovering or proving a scientific mistake in the Bible. The plaintiff in the action claimed 52 mistakes, one of which was a charge that God sent "too many quail" when the Israelites hungered for meat in the wilderness. The court ruled after a hearing which continued for a day and a half that the plaintiff had failed to establish a case.

Dr. Rimmer is widely known as a lecturer on Biblical subjects, particularly as they relate to science and archaeology. His lecture tonight is open to the public. He will enjoy a fishing trip on the Umpqua river tomorrow.
