official or board that handles
public money should publish an
accounting of its expenditures
at the end of each month and
show where and how each dollar
is spent. This is a
fundamental principle of demo-
cratic government.

THE United States Veterans in-
tegrity here is now filled with
patients nearly to its capacity.
Some 500 men are being care-
d for. The total capacity of the
facility is 578.

To care for these patients, main-
tain the building and grounds, and
do the necessary clerical work in
connection with the facility, 220
full time employees are regularly
upon the payroll. The growth
there has been gradual and with-
out publicity and fanfare, but the
fact is the Veterans facility is an
exceedingly important institution
—not only as a business asset to
our community but as a splendid
institution for the benefit of all
veterans of the northwestern
states.

Constant care and attention
have worked wonders in land-
scaping and beautifying. The build-
ings are now surrounded by beau-
tifully kept lawns. The shrubs
and trees are in place and are
enough grown to indicate the
beauty of the completed land-
scaping plan.

The patients themselves do
most of the work on grounds. It
is a part of their treatment to
keep them busy and interested
and the amount of work that has
been done there these last two
years is truly amazing.

Col. E. F. Tandy, manager of the
facility, who took this writer
through the buildings and around
the grounds yesterday morning,
kept pointing out additional beau-
tification and improvement pro-
jects that were started or about
to be undertaken. Without doubt
Col. Tandy's enthusiasm and per-
sonal interest in the work is the
factor that will ultimately bring
the Roseburg Veterans facility to
top position on the list in the U.
S. for beauty of grounds and also
for excellence of operation.

We people of Roseburg have
every reason to be very proud of
the Veterans facility located here,
and pleased that the spirit of the
management is such that neces-
sary rigid government regulation
and routine are tempered with hu-
manity and a striving for beauty
of surroundings.

To the layman who visits the
facility, by long odds the most
interesting department is the oc-
cupational therapy building. There
is a complete workshop for car-
pentry, art, weaving and basket
making. The patients are kept
busy at such work. Obviously
there is enough of a variety of
things to do so that each may de-
vote his time to the work he can
do best and enjoys most. It seems
as though that would be a fine
treatment for the mentally dis-
turbed.

Perhaps the most remarkable
thing about the O. T. work is the
utter perfection of the finished
pieces these men make. How they
can be trained to do it, and do it
so well is a mystery to the writer
of these lines who visited there.
It must be that the director of the
work is a man of unusual skill and
ability in teaching.

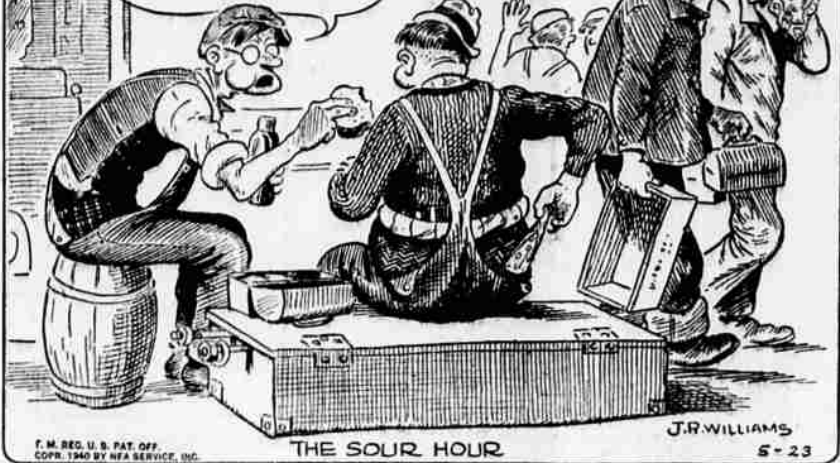
Highlighting tonight's radio

Britain Turns Out
3 Super Warships

LONDON—The royal navy is
commissioning five 35,000-ton bat-
tleships for its fleet against Ger-
many.

Experts say the new men o'
war are "the most strongly pro-
tected battleships in the world."

The new ships were laid down in
the first five months of 1937.
Called the King George V class,
each carries ten 14-inch guns and
sixteen 5.25 guns, plus what the
British admiralty calls "enhanced
defense against an attack."

The 14-inch guns of the new
ships are a new model, officially
rated to have greater effective
range than the 15-inch guns of
earlier ships, "as measured by the
penetration of any given thickness
of armor."

Unofficial but "authoritative" re-
ports placed armor weight of each
of the new ships at 14,000 tons,
and waterline thickness at 16 inches.

Main armaments are the four-gun
turrets, one forward and one aft.
Experts say the King George V
ships carry "probably three" tor-
pedo tubes. There are no torpedo
planes.

The King George V class is ex-
ceeded in size only by the 40,000-
ton Lion and Temeraire and two
unnamed others of the same class,
which still are under construction,
and by the 42,000-ton battleship
Hood, largest warship in the world.
In addition to the 14-inch torpedoes,
each ship carries one twin turret
of 14-inch guns and many smaller
guns, mostly anti-aircraft weapons.
Each will carry 1,500 officers and
men compared to the 1,351 of the
Nelson.

The speed is more than 30 knots
(33 miles per hour) compared
with the Nelson's 23 knots. The
battleship Hood, launched in 1918,
has a designed speed of 31 knots.

Sheila Weigh 1,400 Pounds
The "newmodel" 14-inch gun
fire shells weighing at least 1,400
pounds and probably more. They
have a high rate of fire. They are
superior to the 15-inch guns of
Britain's older battleships in range
and can penetrate thicker armor.

Completion of the King George
V class raises Britain's capital
ship strength to 16, with at least
four more building.

Thirty-five members of the Elks
