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Every state, county and city official or board that handles public money should publish at regular intervals an accounting of it, showing where and how each dollar is spent. This is a fundamental principle of democratic government.

LET the news columns tell the sad story of the war. Let the various horrors of the world be blazoned in heavy headline type. The shameful record of the results of a determined policy of one ruler toward his neighbors—a policy based upon lies, opportunism and treason—does not make pleasant reading.

For the moment at least suppose we look about us in our own little area. Did you know, for example, that a modern cheese factory is now in operation here in Roseburg? Elsewhere in the News-Review today is detailed information and pictures of this new industry.

For a number of years there has been another sort of factory located near the northeast corner of our city. This factory manufactures blanks from which pencils are made.

The Saar pencil plant factory buys planks of incense cedar from the various small sawmills located in this valley. From these planks, which are not otherwise very valuable as lumber, squares are ripped. The material is thoroughly dried in steam heated dry kilns. Some of the lumber coming green from the mill saws requires as much as three weeks of intense drying heat to make it completely dry. The long squares are then trimmed into short squares, each one exactly the same length as all the others, just a little bit longer than the ordinary wooden pencil.

These square blocks are then fed through a machine which first planes them to exact size and then slices them into thin strips. That is the end of the manufacturing operation but not, by any means is it the end of the work required to complete the bundles of slats ready for shipment to the eastern factories where the finished pencils are made.

From the planing and ripping machine the slats are carried automatically on an endless belt into the grading, sorting and packing room. There, women using ordinary garden hoes to pull the slats within their reach, carefully sort and grade the slats, pack them into bundles and take out those that are culls. Color, Mr. Saar says, is an important factor in this product. The incense cedar tree is nearly white in the sap portion and a reddish purple toward the heart. The colors are kept separate as nearly as it is possible to do so.

From 12 to 20 persons have employment in this interesting business. There is plenty of cedar timber in this valley within easy hauling distance of Roseburg—200,000, 000 feet of it according to the forest inventory. So long as people continue to use wooden pencils this will be a permanent industry here.

The following is a continuation of a report of the discussion of various phases of the tuberculosis question by Dr. G. C. Hollinger, superintendent of the state tuberculosis hospital, at a meeting at the Riddle grange hall, May 10:

What is the per cent of positive reactors among school children? The average in the state is less than 5 per cent. Salem high school, having been tested years ago, beginning with some of the seniors. Seventeen and two tenths per cent were positive reactors ten years ago but this year only seven per cent. This decrease has shown in many other schools that have been conducting a testing program over a period of time. Eugene high school has been testing on a rather large scale for about four years. The first year they discovered four active cases around one particular case. Casual contact will seldom cause disease; natural resistance will take care of considerable casual exposure, but close exposure over a long period of time develops definite trouble. Modern methods will detect infection in an apparently robust person before symptoms appear. How well you feel should not be considered in a testing program. The secret is to discover tuberculosis before you have it. X-rays bring out the fact that serious changes have developed before symptoms appear. It is surprising how advanced disease can be in some people before they feel sick.

Is all tuberculosis of the lungs? Eighty-five per cent of the serious tuberculosis in the state of Oregon is in the lungs. The general rule in the lungs is that we never develop tuberculosis of the throat and almost never of the intestine unless we have tuberculosis of the lungs. When is the most dangerous age for developing tuberculosis? Under five years is a very dangerous age. The important aspects being tuberculosis, meningitis and acute military (when little fine centers spread over the body). Fifteen years ago 27 babies under five died in the state from tuberculosis; last year only four. For women the most dangerous period seems to be at about 25 years, and for men, at about 35 years.

Is a fluoroscopic examination as good as an X-ray? The X-ray is better as it provides a better record, more correct detail, and allows comparison with later films. The fluoroscope should be used as a supplement to the film.

How often should contacts have an X-ray? Contacts should have a film at least every year until every doubt is cleared up, particularly if in close contact with an active case of tuberculosis. The first two years definite contacts should be checked every six months. After that once a year until five years of observation have passed.

Will a person who is positive to one test ever be negative to another later test? Once a positive reactor the general rule is that a person will continue positive to all subsequent tests. There are just a few who do not, but these are exceptions.

Is tuberculosis hereditary? No, it is an infection that must pass from one person to another. What is a protective diet? The diet was term protective is, first, one built around milk, second, includes two or three servings of fruits and vegetables daily, and third, includes meat, eggs, and other good wholesome foods.

What are the chances for recovery from tuberculosis? The sooner discovered the greater the probability that the individual will recover and go back to work. Dr. Hollinger stated that they still see people at the sanatorium who were first treated in 1914. They return for checkups but as far as anyone can tell there is no evidence of illness.

Hopefulness of recovery is in direct proportion to early discovery. Twenty years ago we had at least three times as much tuberculosis in this state as at present, so we see the program that is being made.

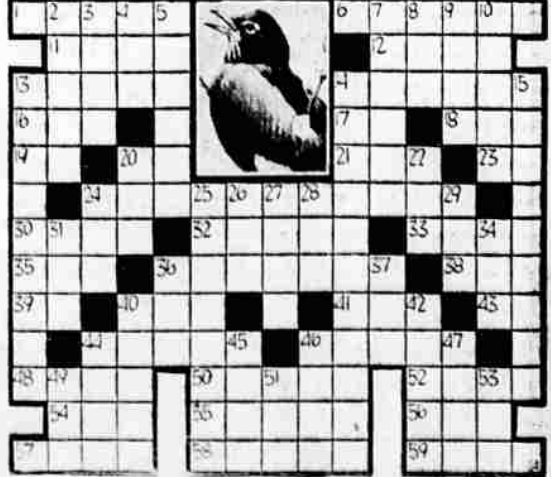
