HOLLYWOOD—Every year, designers sagely predict, "suits will be good this spring—more variety than ever." The thing that convinces me it's true this time is that I went around last week asking movie actresses, "What's your favorite spring costume?"

Eight out of 10 said, "A suit."

But none had the same kind of suit. There was variety in materials, in combinations, and accessories. Here's what they thought and why they think a suit is best for them:

BETTE DAVIS LIKES CHECKS

Bette Davis selected the two-pattern type: a slim skirt of black wool, with a double-breasted short waistcoat and long, tailored topcoat of black and white checks. Different hats are going to change it.

For general daytime wear, she'll top it with a sailor of bright red straw, veiled in black. At restaurant dinners and other dressier places, Miss Davis will wear a black and white checked turban.

Two suits are better than one for Brenda Joyce, because, she said, she gets so much variety. She likes monotone skirts and "fluffy" jackets in checks or stripes. Her favorite spring outfit is a rose-beige skirt with a copper and brown jacket. Next to a suit, she voted for jacket dresses, especially for hot weather tailored clothes.

Three-piece suits are Arleen Whelan's choice, and she chooses her spring dresses with the suit's color in mind. The red and blue tailored rather than dressmaker suits, but specifies plenty of different accessories.

LANE SISTERS ARE INDIVIDUALISTS
