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Every state, county and city official or board that handles public money should publish at regular intervals an accounting of it, showing where and how each dollar is spent. This is a fundamental principle of democratic government.

NO responsible leader of either political party has, so far as we have seen, lent his name to the talk of a "coalition government." The whole thing has been confined to rumors and speculation. That is where it should stay.

The whole American system of government is deeply grounded in a simple mechanism. This mechanism is not provided by the Constitution, but it is so simple and practical that it has operated without a break since Washington's second term. It insures that the voters must have a choice of both candidates and programs.

When the voters have chosen, the winning candidate, party and program are to run the government. The other party remains in opposition, a constant critical check on the party in power. If the party in power does not do well, the other can always offer a program that will suit the voters better. And if the voters see "a better to it," they can always go to it via the ballot box.

The coalition idea proposes that we abandon all this. It proposes that the present democratic government take in an appropriate number of sympathetic republicans so that both parties will be represented in the government at once. There would be no opposition, no check against the acts of the administration, no alternative to which the voters could turn if they do not like what is being done.

It is conceivable that in some desperate national emergency this might have to be done. And yet the United States has survived some pretty desperate crises without it.

During the Civil war, conducted by a republican administration, there was always bitter democratic opposition, which came close to sabotage in some cases, yet the country came through and the voters still had a choice after the war was over.

The World war was conducted by a democratic administration, and while republican cooperation in prosecuting the war was complete and wholehearted, there was never any formal coalition.

There is no need for formal coalition now. As All Landon has said, "party politics stops at the water's edge." Republicans will undoubtedly give complete support to policies once launched. But they should reserve the right to offer alternate policies while decisions are still in the making. And in the meantime life at home goes on. Criticism of domestic policies and the right and duty to offer the voters alternative policies are still vital.

This does not mean that men like Landon and Frank Knox should not be informed as to what goes on, and should not cooperate in every proper way. But to destroy the two-party system with a coalition government is a thing not yet indicated by any situation we face today.

After a long conference with Roosevelt on Wednesday, Landon says: "Political implications are inescapable in any coalition set-up, and republicans can and will participate only if the president

eliminates himself as a 1940 candidate." White House Secretary Early (in a published statement) answers: "The president regrets he has no time just now to give to the preparation of political statements."

THIS simple statement would take very, very little of President Roosevelt's time: "I will NOT BE A CANDIDATE for a third term." It would clear the air of a lot of doubt and suspicion.

U. S. Planes Given Superior Sight

CAMP BEAUREGARD, La., May 25. (AP)—A "miracle" bomb sight, army officers believe, has given American bombers more deadly accuracy than any plane dumping destruction over European battlefields today.

Praise for the device—a closely guarded military secret—came from officers at the army maneuvers in western Louisiana where the air force has concentrated 250 planes, including 116 bombers, in a huge demonstration to coordinate its work with ground troops.

One officer said the sight used in the heavy bombers which do their work from an elevation of perhaps 15,000 feet, is so precise that a "plane three miles up could almost drop its eggs in a barrel or knock your hat off."

"I have heard it asserted that the Germans claim a bomb sight as good as ours," the officer explained, "but I doubt it." This was the explanation given: The heavy American bomber, flying calmly on a level keel, sights and drops its cargo from a height so great as to be out of reach of anti-aircraft fire.

Other nations have bomb sights in their heavy ships but it is the level keel and precision that rates the American instrument above them.

Officers reported that a bomber flying at 15,000 feet and using the American instrument scored five direct hits out of six bombs dropped on the outline of a battleship in a field at recent maneuvers at Fort Benning, Ga.
