

### Bus Drivers Ask Sympathy Strike

SAN FRANCISCO, May 28.—(AP)—A proposal for a sympathy strike of Southern Pacific switchmen and brakemen in support of the walkout of Pacific Greyhound bus drivers was forwarded by union leaders to A. F. Whitney, international president of the Independent Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen in Cleveland, Ohio.

Frank W. Coyle, deputy president of the brotherhood and director of its strike in seven western states against Greyhound, said he thought Whitney would approve the sympathy strike "within a few days."

At Cleveland last night, Whitney, except for saying that such a strike would be possible, with his authorization, and stating that the brotherhood "has had considerable trouble with the Southern Pacific," did not comment further.

Bus driver members of the brotherhood walked out against Greyhound May 16, charging the company had refused to comply with an NLRB order to bargain with them collectively. The company has maintained operations under a contract with the Amalgamated Association of Street, Electric Railway and Motor Coach Employees (A.M.E.).

Concerning the new strike threat, Southern Pacific officials said he saw "no possibility" of such an occurrence.
