der a curfew and activity limitation to become effective June 3. They are forbidden to own or "control" a bicycle, motor vehicle, seaplane or aircraft.

LONDON, May 29.—(AP)—Military circles reported today that the Belgian royal children had been sent to refuge in France while their father, King Leopold, remained with the Belgian army.

PARIS, May 29.—(AP)—The newspaper Paris Soir reported today the Belgian royal children had arrived at Lisbon, where they are expected to remain for the rest of the war.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—(AP)—Secretary Hull said today active consideration was being given to the possibility of receiving Belgian refugees in the United States.

VIGO, Spain, May 29.—(AP)—The German submarine offensive on allied shipping was resumed today with an attack on two ships five miles from Salvora island, off Spain's northeastern coast.

A French merchantman, the M. de Joux, about 5,000 tons, was torpedoed and sunk. The British tanker Tolosa, of 7,400 tons, was battered by shelling but remained afloat and was being towed into Vigo.

One allied push was reported in the area of the Somme river. Another attack was noted further east, along the Aisne river, where 20 divisions, or between 40,000 and 600,000 men, were massed.

The Germans pounded on with all their might of air power, tanks and artillery on the allied divisions crushed into a triangle around Lille about 25 miles wide and 55 miles long.

Nazis described this area as being based on the channel coast, about 50 miles wide but tapered sharply to about 25 miles and reaching a point at St. Armand, about 20 miles southeast of Lille.

The London air ministry announced that the royal air force attacked the Germans "continuously yesterday, last night and today."

At least 22 enemy planes were brought down. "All our aircraft returned," the announcement said.

They were included, with all other neutrals as well as nationals of countries allied with Britain, un-
