"Clean Politics" Bill Again Okayed

WASHINGTON, May 29.—(AP)—

The house judiciary committee today approved the senate-approved Hatch bill to extend to federal employees restrictions on political activity now applied to federal employees alone.

The committee which once shelved the legislation then reversed itself and agreed to give it further consideration was reported to have approved it by the vote of 16 to 7.

The Hatch legislation would broaden the so-called Hatch "clean politics" act passed last year for federal workers. It would apply to state workers paid in whole or in part by federal funds the act's restrictions on "pernicious" political activity.

It also would limit the expenditures of a national campaign committee to \$3,000,000 in any campaign. In 1936 the republican national committee disbursed \$8,067,524 and the democratic national committee \$5,038,543.

Another provision would limit the total campaign contributions by any one person to \$5,000.

Sprague Going East to Attend Governors' Meet

WASHINGTON, May 29.—(AP)—

Charles A. Sprague will leave Portland tomorrow for a midwestern trip on which he will be absent from the state until June 16. Speaker of the House Ernest R. Patlund, Oregon republican, will become acting governor, and will spend part of the time in Salem.

The governor will be in Duluth, Minn., on June 2 and 3 for the national conference of governors, to whom he will make an address on relief. He will go to Monmouth college, Ill., his alma mater, to receive an honorary degree on June 4.

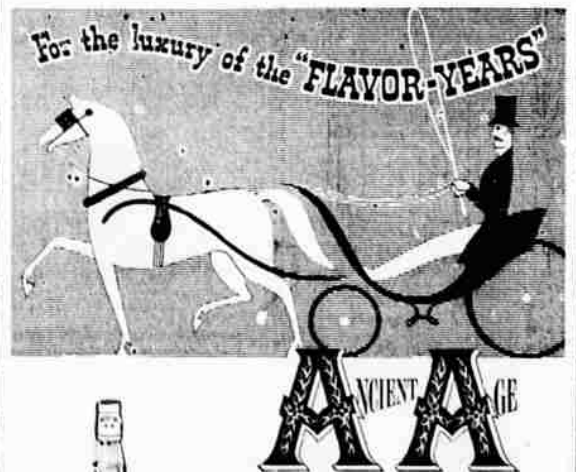

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Yanks Battle Way To Fourth Place

The New York Yankees have arrived back in the first division of the American league and apparently have finally found the trail that can lead to their coveted fifth consecutive world championship.

The Yanks humbled the Washington Senators 12-4 and 3-1 in a doubleheader yesterday, to attain six victories in their last seven games—in fact, nine victories in 12 games since that demoralizing eight-game losing streak.

Today New York is only 61 games out of first place and easily can be riding the crest before the Fourth of July. The Yanks will play three games with the league-leading Boston Red Sox tomorrow and Friday.

In subduing the Senators, the McCaffreymen rolled 12 runs on 14 hits in the first game and Rookie Marvin Bruer limited Washington to seven hits in the second.

The Red Sox tightened their hold on first place at least temporarily by defeating the Philadelphia Athletics 4-1 in a night game after the second place Cleveland Indians had lost to Detroit 8-5.

The Yankees' leap from sixth to fourth place was made possible by the Chicago White Sox dropping both ends of a doubleheader to the St. Louis Browns, 10-9 and 7-5.

The Cincinnati Reds dropped a 5-2 decision to Pittsburgh, their first loss to the Pirates this year, and slumped substantially into second place in the National league behind Brooklyn.

The Chicago Cubs were shut out by the St. Louis Cardinals 5-0 on the fourth hurling of Lander.

The Brooklyn Dodgers cut down the Phillies 12-0 for their fifth consecutive victory and Fitzsimmons' fourth without defeat in a night game.

Holman Backs Ban On "Reds," Nazis

WASHINGTON, May 29.—(AP)—

Senator Holman (R-Ore.) joined Senator Reynolds (D-N.C.) in urging the senate to bar members of the communist party and nazi organizations from employment by firms doing an interstate business.

Reynolds asked the action during consideration of the bill (S. 7570) to regulate oppressive labor practices.

"The devastating labor trouble we had recently on the Pacific coast," Holman said, "were fomented, guided and conducted by aliens."

Holman said there had been no trouble between the employers and labor that it was a jurisdictional fight "between labor racketeers of honest labor."

Holman stated he knew of one case where an employer lost \$100,000 in a short time because of differences between labor groups.

"This all was carried on," he explained, "by alien leaders." Reynolds said the nazi organization members took their orders from Berlin and the communist party members from Moscow.
