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Umpqua Academy Reunion Planned

The 87th anniversary of the founding of the Umpqua academy will be celebrated Wilbur Sunday at the 25th annual reunion of the Umpqua Academy association. The celebration will include a morning church service, conducted by the Rev. Orval Trick, pastor at Sutherlin; a basket lunch during the noon hour; and a public program during the afternoon.

The Umpqua academy was founded in 1853 by the Rev. Father Wilbur, a Methodist missionary, who established and conducted the first school of academic learning between Salem and Sacramento. Many of the state's most prominent citizens received their education in the school set up in pioneer days. The academy in more recent years was absorbed by the public school system.

Twenty-four years ago an association of the former students of the school was formed, and reunions have been held each year. The membership includes the alumni of the Umpqua academy and the graduates of Wilbur high school.

Sunday's program will open with a short business session at which officers will be elected for the forthcoming year and other regular business transacted. The membership of Wilbur and Sutherlin will join with the association for religious services at 11 a. m. The basket dinner will be served at 12:30 p. m. Coffee and cream will be furnished on the grounds.

The afternoon program will start at 2 o'clock and feature an address by A. C. Marsters of Roseburg.
