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Every state, county and city
 official or board that handles
 public money should publish at
 regular intervals an accounting of
 it, showing where and how
 each dollar is spent. This is a
 fundamental principle of democ-
 ratic government.

THE rest of those who perished
 in the attempt, such a short
 time ago, to save the world for-
 ever, they hoped, from just the
 sort of thing that is happening to-
 day, will not be broken. Willis
 Thornton, noted columnist, takes
 that thought on which to write
 the following paragraphs dedi-
 cated to this Memorial day:

Nothing, not the rumble of steel
 monsters, not the chatter of machine-
 guns, not the tearing ex-
 plosions of bombs, can break the
 sleep of the dead we honor this
 Memorial day.

In Flanders fields, the crash
 and roar of a new and fiercer war
 surges over the very graves of the
 American boys who followed
 a bright dream to France in 1917
 and 1918. But for those who stayed
 behind to enrich with their
 sweat "some corner of a foreign
 field," there is the same eternal
 rest and sleep as has been given
 their comrades who rest in cedar-
 groved Arlington. Battle and
 quick agony, or the exaltation of
 the taken town have no mean-
 ing any longer for these dead.

They had their day, and it was
 bright and glorious. Another gen-
 eration has come, and we almost
 hesitate to repeat to them what
 was in the minds and hearts of
 the boys who sailed away in 1917
 —so changed in the world, so
 tarnished the dream.

But there was a day, April 2,
 1917, when the alicetic and hag-
 gard face of a president focussed
 the eyes of congress, and his
 words were measured as they rolled
 out.

But the right is more
 precious than peace, and we
 shall fight for the things
 which we have always car-
 ried nearest our hearts—for
 democracy, for the right of
 those who submit to authority
 to have a voice in their
 own governments, for the
 rights and liberties of small
 nations, for a universal dis-
 cussion of right by such a
 concert of free peoples as shall
 bring peace and safety to all
 nations and make the world
 itself at last free.

So they sailed away, and it was
 not the fault of any of those who
 went to their long sleep in Fland-
 ers that these things were not to be.

Those who survived were the
 ones who had to see the tarnish,
 the dishonor, the failure. Those
 who survived lived on to become
 hard, indifferent, without faith.
 They lived to see it all come
 again, and come in a grimmer
 guise, without exaltation.

No, the gods can not disturb
 those dead we honor now. They
 saw, they served, they died in
 faith of youth and power. Serene
 in the faith that what they gave
 their lives to gain must come
 some day, they sleep the sleep un-
 broken.

To whatever cause he believed
 will serve those ends today, let
 each rededicate himself in re-
 membering our honored dead.

 need American goods, materials
 and services. We may not like
 Hitler, but that will be no reason
 for not trading with Germany.
 We are supposed to look upon Ja-
 pan as our probable enemy in the
 event of trouble, but for years
 we have been Japan's best cus-

tomers and Japan has been one of
 our best.
 (Britain and France aren't de-
 feated yet, and every day they
 hold makes it less likely that
 they will lose disastrously.)

PRESIDENT Roosevelt adds:
 "American defense require-
 ments will be built up to what-
 ever heights the future may re-
 quire."

That is true. We have the time.
 We have the materials. We have
 the ingenuity and the skill and
 the ABILITY TO WORK HARD
 that are required.

There is no occasion for panic.
 It may even do us good to have
 a national goal we are all agreed
 on. We have been working at
 cross purposes TOO LONG.
